OBJECT.

2. It influences public opinion in favour of an Equal Franchise between men and women, an Equal Moral Standard, Equal Pay and Opportunities in Industry and the Professions, and a better economic and legal status for the married woman.
3. Its Edward Wright and Cavendish Bentinck Library is the best Reference and Lending Library on Questions of Interest to Women as Citizens.
4. It organises Summer Schools, Conference and Meetings for the Education of the Woman citizen.

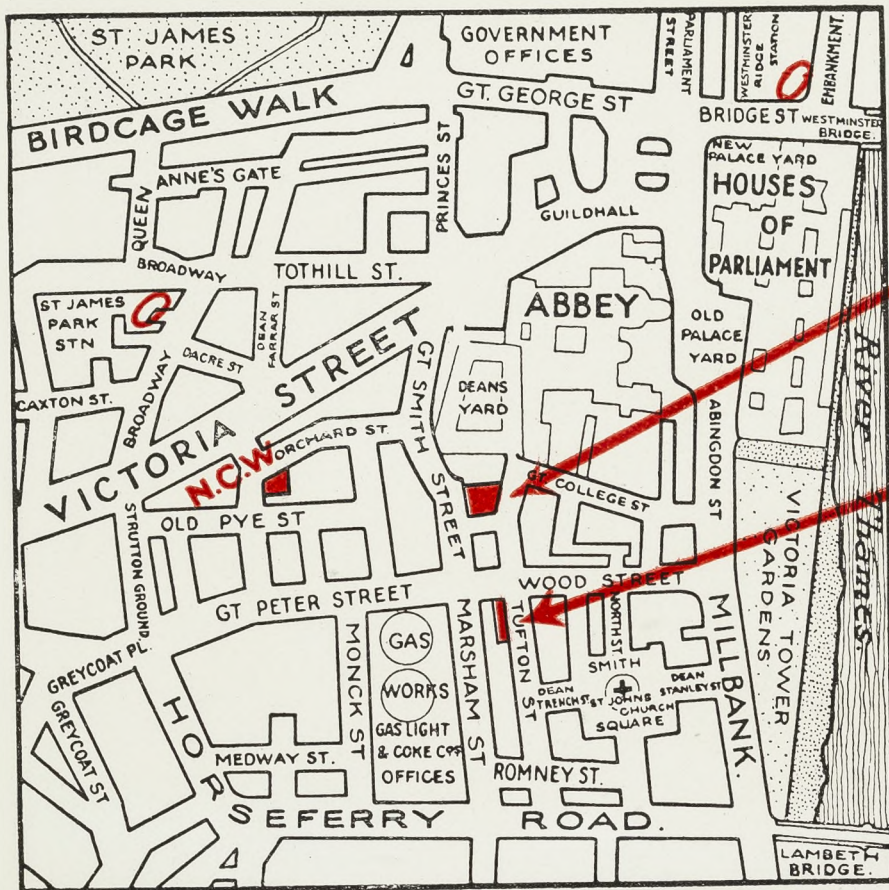

was founded 31 years ago and is the largest and most representative body of women in the country. It consists of 147 nationally organised societies and of individual members and differs from other societies in bringing together women holding very diverse political, social and religious opinions.

It enables women of all shades of thought to work together for objects on which they can find a common ground of agreement. It focuses the opinions of thinking women from all parts of the country and brings pressure to bear upon local authorities and government departments to give effect to their wishes.

It has initiated many important and far-reaching movements, such as:—

- The appointment of Women Police.
- The appointment of women on local Education Authorities.
- The provision of rest-rooms for women and girls employed in exhibitions.
- The use of travelling maternity and child welfare exhibitions.

It has also started many useful societies now working independently, for example:

- The Council for the Representation of Women in the League of Nations.
- The National Women Citizens' Association.
- The National Organisation of Girls' Clubs.
- The Central Bureau for the Employment of Women.
- The Association of Teachers of Domestic Science.

Through its 16 Sectional Committees, it

- (a) Considers Bills before Parliament, especially those affecting women and children, and watches the administration of Acts of Parliament with a view to securing their efficient working.
- (b) Promotes measures beneficial for public health, especially those dealing with maternity and child welfare; educational reforms; temperance; the improvement of industrial conditions, etc.
- (c) Supports the League of Nations in its efforts to secure peace through arbitration.

Conduct of Debate.

1. The first meeting of the Council each day shall open with silent prayer.
2. During the sitting of the Council a member speaking shall address the Chair from the platform. Short questions may be asked, or points of order raised from the body of the meeting.
3. The ruling of the Chair, on a point of order, on the advisability of a personal explanation, or on the time limit, shall be final and shall not be open to discussion.
4. Amendments to resolutions may be moved at the meeting.
5. Every amendment shall be in writing, signed by the mover, and handed to the Chair.
6. No member shall, without permission from the Chair, address the Council more than once on any motion or amendment; the mover of an original motion may, however, reply, but she shall confine herself to answering previous speakers, and shall not introduce any new matter into the debate. After the reply, the question shall be put forthwith. The right of reply shall not extend to the mover of an amendment which, having been carried, has become the substantive motion.
7. Any member, whether she has spoken on the matter or not, may rise to a point of order, to ask a question, or in explanation; such explanation shall be confined to some material part of her former speech, which may have been misunderstood. A member so rising shall be entitled to be heard forthwith.
8. A motion or amendment may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the meeting, which shall be signified without debate; and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked permission for its withdrawal, unless such permission shall have been refused.
9. A member who has formally seconded an amendment can speak to it at a later stage.
10. Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of. If an amendment be carried, the motion as amended shall become the substantive resolution, upon which any further amendment shall be moved.
11. No member shall be at liberty to move more than one amendment upon any motion.
12. A resolution shall not be taken as carried by the National Council unless passed by two-thirds of the members present and voting. Tellers for this purpose shall be appointed at the meeting.

URGENCY RESOLUTIONS.

1. Factories Bill.

"That the National Council of Women, while welcoming the new Factories Bill, and especially the measures introduced for protecting workers against ill-health, accidents and fire, begs the Government so to amend the Bill as to make the provision of washing facilities and some accommodation for drying and keeping outdoor clothing compulsory in all work places, and to extend the provision of a weekly rest day and protection against overstrain from heavy weights to all workers, male and female.

Further, the National Council of Women most earnestly deprecates any lessening of the present restrictions on overtime for young persons."

Proposed by Miss Cecile Matheson, Industrial Committee.
Seconded by Miss Mary Phillips.

2. Solicitation Laws.

"This Council, noting that on March 25th, 1926, the Home Secretary stated in reply to a question by Sir Robert Newman, that he was considering the terms of reference and the personnel of a Committee of Enquiry into the Solicitation Laws, urges the Government to make a public announcement as soon as possible of the appointment of such a Committee of Enquiry, including the terms of reference, and if possible, the personnel."

Proposed by Miss Alison Neilans, on behalf of the Executive Committee.

Seconded by Miss Picton Turbervill, O.B.E.

RESOLUTIONS.

1. Mental Defectives.

"That the National Council of Women is of opinion that an organised attempt should be made to reduce the numbers of the mentally unfit. This Council urges as a practical step immediately possible, that Poor Law Guardians should make use of the powers they have, to ensure that every woman in receipt of poor relief at the time of the birth of her second illegitimate child, and prior to her discharge, be examined by an expert under Part I Section II. b. VI. of the Mental Deficiency Act."

Proposed by Mrs. W. A. Potts, Birmingham Branch.
Seconded by the Lady Maud Rolleston, C.B.E., J.P.

2. Royal Commission on Lunacy.

"That in view of the large proportion of women patients and women staff in our Public Mental Hospitals the National Council of Women urges that, in any legislation which may follow the publication of the Report of the Royal Commission on Lunacy and Mental Disorder, the inclusion of a suitable number of women on the Committees directly responsible for the administration of all Public Mental Hospitals should be made compulsory, the number in no case to be less than two."

Proposed by Miss Pugh Jones, Llangollen Branch.
Seconded by Miss Darbyshire, R.R.C., the College of Nursing.

Amendment:

"That the last clause, viz., *the number in no case to be less than two*, be omitted."

Proposed by the Standing Committee of Scottish Branches.

3. Sexual Offences.

"The National Council of Women, having considered the recommendations contained in the Report of the Departmental Committee on Sexual Offences against Young Persons, approves generally of its provisions and urges His Majesty's Government to introduce legislation at the earliest possible date on the lines suggested. The Council asks further that instructions should be issued forthwith by the Home Department, dealing with such recommendations as can be carried into effect by administrative action."

Proposed by Miss Kelly, C.B.E., J.P. Portsmouth Branch.
Seconded by Miss K. J. Stephenson, C.C., J.P., Salisbury Branch.

Amendment:

"That the National Council of Women, having considered the recommendations contained in the Reports of the Departmental Committees on Sexual Offences against Young Persons approves generally of *their* provisions . . . lines suggested. The Council asks further that instructions should be issued forthwith by the Home Department *and by the Scottish Office* dealing with such recommendations. . . ."

Proposed by the Standing Committee of Scottish Branches.

4. Housing—Slum Clearance.

"That the National Council of Women deplors the evil effects of bad housing conditions on the community throughout the kingdom, and calls for more vigorous action on the part of the Government and of public authorities to remedy these injurious conditions by accelerating their housing schemes and slum clearance."

Proposed by Mrs. Oldfield, London Branch.
Seconded by Miss Helen Ward.

5. Housing—Reconditioning.

"That the National Council of Women is of opinion that the reconditioning of such of the older houses, both in town and country, as are suitable for this treatment, should receive more attention from Local Authorities and private owners than has hitherto been the case."

Proposed by Miss Churton, Association of Women House Property Managers.
Seconded by the Lady Emmott, J.P.

6. Equal Franchise.

"That the National Council of Women calls upon the Government to introduce and carry into law without delay a simple franchise measure to enfranchise women at the same age and on the same terms as men."

Proposed by Miss Anna Munro, Women's Freedom League.
Seconded by the National Union of Societies for Equal Citizenship.

Amendment:

"That the National Council of Women calls upon the Government to introduce and carry into law without delay a simple franchise measure to enfranchise women at the same age, and on the same terms as men, *provided that the voting age of both sexes be 25 years.*"

Proposed by the Aberdeen Branch.

7. Open Spaces.

"That this Council, recognising that an adequate supply of open spaces for the exercise, rest and recreation both of adults and young people is essential for the physical and moral welfare of the nation, strongly urges upon all public authorities concerned the necessity for making proper provision in this respect whilst land is still available for the purpose, whether in connection with housing and town-planning schemes or otherwise."

Proposed by Mrs. Basil Holmes, Metropolitan Public Gardens Association.

Seconded by Miss Baumann, All England Women's Hockey Association.

Rider:

That the following words be added: "*and in particular to allocate land definitely for Elementary School playing grounds for schools in congested areas.*"

Proposed by the Birmingham Branch.

8. Equal Pay for Equal Work.

"That the National Council of Women reaffirms its adherence to the principle of equal pay for equal work, accepted by the nation in the payment of Members of Parliament, and calls upon the Government to establish equal rates of payment as between men and women performing similar duties in the Civil Service and in the teaching profession."

Proposed by Miss E. E. Froud, National Union of Women Teachers.

Seconded by Miss Anna Munro, Women's Freedom League.

N.B.—The following resolutions are only printed in case time should allow of the discussion of more than eight. Amendments to them may be moved in the Hall.

9. Animals for Sale in Shops.

"That the National Council of Women considers that there is urgent need for reform of the conditions under which live animals, such as monkeys, dogs, cats, rabbits, birds, etc., are kept and offered for sale in shops. The Council therefore demands that such shops be open for better inspection, both by the police and by accredited

inspectors of animal protection societies, and would further urge the adoption of a regular system of Government inspection of all premises where animals are kept for sale.

Proposed by Miss Constance Warner, London Branch.

Seconded by the Bristol Branch.

10. Family Allowances.

"That this Council approves of the general principle of Family Allowances, and, whilst not committing itself to any of the various methods proposed for giving effect to that principle, recommends Societies represented on the Council to make a special study of the subject, with a view to determining how the principle may best be applied so as to suit the economic and social conditions of the country."

Proposed by Miss Eleanor Rathbone, National Union of Societies for Equal Citizenship.

11. Treatment of Venereal Disease.

"Whilst fully appreciating the great progress made in the efforts to reduce Venereal Disease, the National Council of Women asks the Ministry of Health, the Local Authorities and the Hospitals concerned to increase the facilities for diagnosis and treatment for expectant mothers and for married women and children, under conditions not entailing attendance at a Venereal Disease centre.

Proposed by Dr. Margaret Rorke, British Social Hygiene Council.

Seconded by Dr. Mary Douie.

12. "Oxford" Liquor Bill.

"That the National Council of Women, believing that the drink problem constitutes a grave menace to the welfare of the nation, urges His Majesty's Government to introduce a democratic measure of temperance legislation on the lines of the "Oxford" Liquor (Popular Control) Bill, giving the three options: no change, reorganisation and no licence."

Proposed by the Committee for the Oxford Liquor (Popular Control) Bill.

Excursions and Visits to Places of Interest in and around London.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 22ND.

It is an old saying that the nearer the church the further from grace, and on something the same principle inhabitants of Great Britain, even Londoners themselves, know less of their wonderful capital city than their fellow citizens from the ends of the earth. The Executive of the N.C.W., aided by the kindness of different hosts and hostesses, has arranged for the last day of the Conference—Friday, Oct. 22nd—a number of visits to historic places in and near London, when delegates may have an opportunity of seeing them under most favourable auspices as guests rather than tourists.

Excursions to Welwyn Garden City, Hampstead Garden Suburb and the Children's Home will appeal to others whose interests are more keenly roused by the practical matters of the present day.

The following notes on the History and Buildings of London, on Museums and picture galleries, may be useful to those who prefer exploring on their own account.

The story of London begins in the days of primitive man and excavations give us glimpses of its earliest history, of times indeed before history, when savage tribes used flint instruments and sailed their coracles on the Thames. For some 400 years after the beginning of the Christian era the Romans dwelt and traded in a busy city, and fragments are still to be seen of the encircling Roman Wall. In a passage off the Strand are the remains of a Roman Bath, and quite recently the old foundation of the Roman forum has been discovered. When invading Saxons took possession of the abandoned Roman province they built up a city of their own, but a great fire in 1135 destroyed Saxon London, and perhaps the only remains of it are to be found in the Cloisters of Westminster Abbey (the remains of Edward the Confessor's building) and in the names of Saxon Saints to whom churches, later rebuilt on the same precincts, were dedicated: e.g., St. Botolph, St. Dunstan, St. Osyth. The Normans have left their mark in many buildings: The Tower, St. Bartholomew the Great, the Temple Church, and other places. Parts of Southwark Cathedral and of Westminster Abbey belong to the 13th century, and St. Ethelburg's to the 14th, Lambeth Palace and part of the Guildhall, most of the Abbey, St. Helen's, Bishopsgate; Crosby Hall, represent the 15th century; and the Middle Temple Hall was built in the "spacious days of Great Elizabeth" herself.

The great fire of London in 1666 destroyed the old city with its wooden buildings, of which Staple Inn in Holborn is a specimen still remaining. Many of the City churches (including St. Paul's Cathedral) the work of Sir Christopher Wren, belong to the rebuilding of the City after the great disaster. St. Olaves, Hart St., is noteworthy as the place where the fire was stayed, and also as the parish church of Samuel Pepys.

The different styles of architecture which have followed each other in the succeeding centuries may be traced: (a) in the old Banqueting House of Whitehall (now the United Services Museum) and the York House Water Gate, both the work of Inigo Jones in the 17th Century; (b) the Foundling Hospital, the long river Terrace of Somerset House, the Mansion House and the Bank of England of the 18th century. To the nineteenth century we owe, among other buildings, Buckingham Palace, the Royal Exchange, the Law Courts, the Albert Hall, the Victoria and Albert Museum and the general mass of buildings about South Kensington, as opposed to Kensington proper, the old Court Suburb, much of which goes back to the 17th century, as far or farther than Kensington Palace itself.

Of 20th century buildings Westminster Cathedral is amongst the finest and the great blocks for Commercial purposes—Australia House, Bush House, Adelaide House and others—are also noteworthy.

Whatever subject, whatever age interests the student of English life, he or she will find enlightenment in London. The place names show its history. In its graves lie the most famous English dead. Along its streets have passed the great men of every age of our era, from Agricola to Marshal Foch, but never, since William the Norman ousted his Saxon rival, the foot of a conqueror. Every corner of London has its memory of the writers who have given us our English literature; the old Inns of the Borough whence Chaucer's Pilgrims went on their way to Canterbury; Blackfriars, where stood Shakespeare's Globe Theatre; Fleet Street, down which Dr. Johnson "took his walks"; Bunhill Row where Milton lived at No. 17, the streets about Holborn where dwelt the immortal Sairy Gamp and Mrs. Prig—and possibly Mrs. Harris also, and the Charterhouse, where Thackeray's Col. Newcome answered "Adsum" to his Master's call.

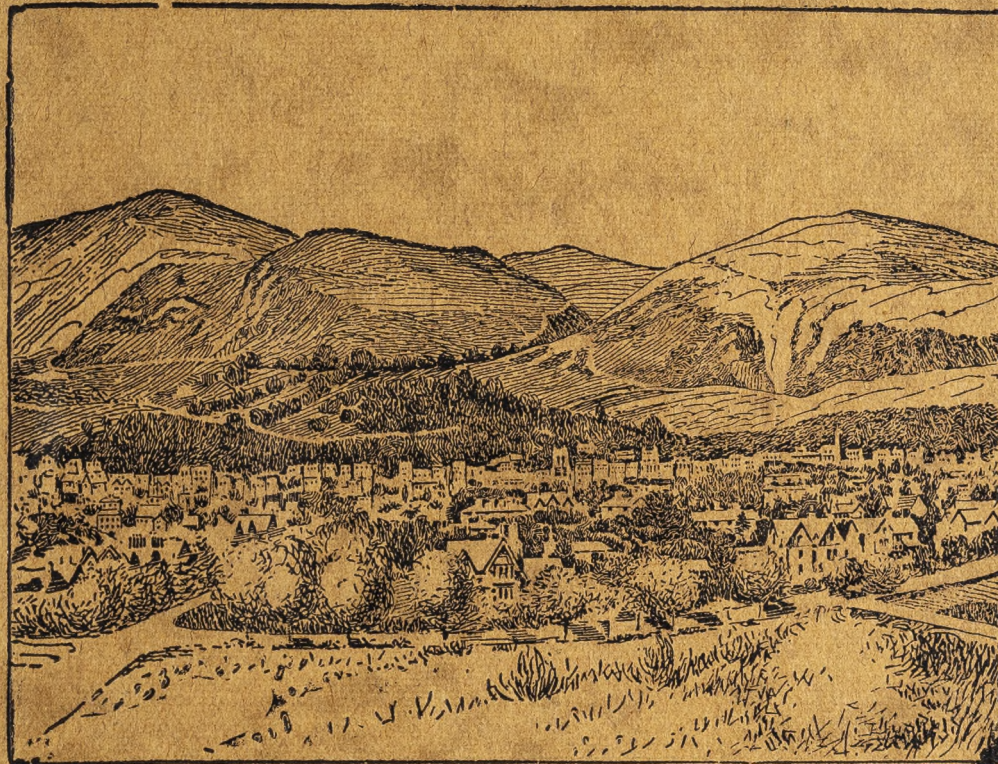
