CONSTITUTION.

I. **Title.**

The title of the Council shall be "the Junior Council of the London and National Society for Women's Service."

II. **Status.**

The Junior Council is an organisation working independently within the London and National Society for Women's Service, whose General Meeting governs the policy of the whole Society. There is no obligation upon the Junior Council as a body to work for any one of the activities of the Society.

III. **Object.**

The Junior Council supports the aim of the London and National Society for Women's Service for equality of citizenship between men and women, and works specially for equal economic opportunities and freedom for women in the pursuit of their work.

IV. **Methods.**

1. The Council holds regular meetings of a social character, with speakers on topics of common interest and collects information on Trainings and Openings for women.
2. The Council enables professional and business women to meet each other, and links up students with women already practising or in business.
3. The Council provides opportunities for the development of new enterprise.

V. **Governing Body.**

The governing body of the Junior Council shall be the general meeting of members, which will elect annually by ballot an Executive Committee, an Hon. Secretary, and an Hon. Treasurer to conduct the current business of the Council.

VI. **Membership.**

1. Subject as hereinafter mentioned:—  
The Junior Council shall consist of (a) men and women who have or have had a professional or business qualification; and (b) of students: (i) who

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support its aims; (ii) whose applications have been passed by the Executive Committee; and (iii) who have paid the current annual subscription.

2. The minimum annual subscription shall be 10/- for all members for five years from the date of joining the Junior Council and shall then be raised to £1. This shall apply only to those members who join on or after 1st January, 1935. Members shall have the right to use the Library, restaurant, and other facilities provided by the Society.
3. The Executive Committee shall have the right to terminate any membership without assigning a reason.
4. Membership of the Junior Council carries with it membership of the Society.

#### VII. Officers.

The Officers of the Council shall be the Chairman, the Hon. Secretary, and the Hon. Treasurer.

#### VIII. Executive Committee.

1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Junior Council, and not less than nine and not more than twelve other members to be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting, and shall have power to co-opt not more than five additional members. Three members of the Executive Committee shall retire each year in order of seniority of service and shall be ineligible to stand for election for one year; in the event of there being more than three members of equal seniority, the order of retirement shall be determined by lot at the Executive Committee. No officer shall hold office for more than five successive years.
2. At the first meeting after election, it shall elect the Chairman for the ensuing year.
3. It may from time to time make Bye-laws, and shall have power to fill by co-option any vacancies which may occur during its term of office.
4. It shall have power to appoint Sub-Committees for special purposes.
5. The Minutes of the Executive Committee of the Junior Council shall be open to the Executive Committee of the Society.

#### IX. Nominations.

1. Any member may be proposed for election or re-election as Honorary Officer or Member of the Committee on the nomination of two members of the Council to whom the candidate is personally known.
2. Nominations, with the consent in writing of the candidate nominated, shall reach the Secretary at least fourteen clear days before the Annual Meeting.

#### X. Meetings.

1. An Annual General Meeting of the Council, of which not less than twenty-eight clear days' preliminary notice shall be given to each member, shall be held as soon as convenient after April 1st in each year.
2. Special General Meetings of the Council (a) may be called at any time by the Executive Committee either of the Junior Council or of the Society, and (b) shall be called by the Secretary within twenty-eight clear days on the requisition of not less than one-tenth of the members of the Council, of not less than three calendar months' standing. A Special General Meeting shall discuss only such matters as are mentioned in the notice calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice shall be given of General Meetings to all members.
3. Joint meetings of the Executive Committees of the Junior Council and the Society shall be held at the request of either Committee.

#### XI. Resolutions.

Proposed Resolutions to be discussed at the Annual General Meeting with names of proposers and seconders shall reach the Secretary in writing at least fourteen clear days before the meeting, and shall have been published at least seven clear days before that date. Resolutions shall be passed by a majority vote except as hereinafter provided.

#### XII. Alteration of Constitution.

The Constitution shall not be altered except by resolution passed at a General Meeting of the Council by two-thirds of the members present and voting, provided always that no rule of the Junior Council shall be at variance with the Constitution of the Society as a whole. The nature of the proposed alteration must be stated in the notices calling the meeting, and not less than fourteen clear days' notice given to all members.



**JUNIOR COUNCIL ANNUAL MEETING.**

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**I. Appointment of Returning Officer and Tellers.**

Moved Miss S. Lister, seconded Mrs. Burton and passed that Miss E. H. Garnham should act as Returning Officer and Mrs. R. G. Knollys and Miss D. H. Sanders as Tellers.

**II. Appointment of Auditor.**

Moved Miss F. H. Bachrach, seconded Miss M. Sampson and passed that E. Watts & Co. be appointed Hon. Auditors for the ensuing year.

**III. Annual Report.**

The Annual Report was then read by the Hon. Secretary, Miss K. M. Halpin. Moved Mrs. George Burton, seconded Miss Irene Stoney and passed "that the Report be adopted, printed and circulated." Miss Strachey congratulated the Junior Council on the many and varied activities crowded into the year and Miss Arne asked leave to move a vote of appreciation of the work of the Executive Committee. Carried unanimously.

**IV. Treasurer's Report.**

The statement of accounts was read by the Hon. Treasurer, Miss C. G. Gatey. Moved Miss M. H. Pearson, seconded Miss H. O'Malley that the financial statement be adopted. Carried unanimously.

**V. Constitution. Alteration of Rules.**

Rule 6. Membership. Proposed by the Executive Committee:—Paragraph ii. Delete the words "The new rule to come into operation for those members who have already served for five years when their subscriptions become due in 1935," and substitute "This shall apply only to those members who join on or after 1st January, 1935." Carried unanimously.

At the end of paragraph ii, insert the following new paragraph:—"Members who leave London but still wish to be connected with the Junior Council may apply to become Associate Members. Such members shall pay an Annual

Subscription of 5/- and shall be entitled to receive notices of the Annual and Special General Meetings and a copy of the Annual Report. Each application for Associate Membership shall be considered by the Executive Committee on its merits." After some discussion it was proposed by the Chairman and seconded by Miss Petersen that, as it would appear advisable for longer consideration to be given to the suggested innovation, all Junior Council members who resign during the next twelve months should be asked if they would welcome the possibility of remaining as Associate Members. The result of such enquiries to be communicated to the members at the next Annual Meeting. Carried.

Miss Stoney made a special request, seconded by Miss Lister, that this proposition should be discussed by the Groups at their meetings during the year. Carried.

**VI. Women's Employment Federation. First Annual Report.**

Mrs. Strachey gave a résumé of the work accomplished during the first year of the Federation's existence and explained that a placing pool for vacancies carrying a starting salary of £300 or over had been instituted. She asked all Junior Council members to keep a special look-out for suitable candidates for registration for such posts.

**VII. Election of Executive Committee.**

Miss M. H. Pearson was returned unopposed as Hon. Treasurer and Miss K. M. Halpin was re-elected Hon. Secretary. Eighteen nominations were received for membership of the Executive Committee, a ballot was held and thirteen members were subsequently elected. The result of the Ballot was announced by the Returning Officer.

The names of members serving on the newly-elected Executive will be found inside the cover of the Report.

## JUNIOR COUNCIL

### ANNUAL REPORT, 1935.

The Junior Council is now nine years old, and is as vigorous and essentially young as when it was first founded. It is now clearly proved that the mixture of purpose and entertainment which it provides meets a real need, and its ninth birthday may be a suitable moment to recall how and why the Junior Council came into existence and to state the reason of its continued success.

The London and National Society for Women's Service has been in existence since 1866 and has passed through many evolutions. After working for the vote it turned its energies towards improving the economic position of women and by 1926 it seemed that the young women enjoying the opportunities and freedom already gained should be drawn in to share in the work that remained to be done. But somehow they were not interested. They definitely disliked the idea of "feminism," knew nothing of the pre-war difficulties of women, and thought the world lay open to them without any special disabilities attaching to themselves as women.

The Executive Committee of the Society saw all this and were troubled by it. They knew that there was still a great deal of work to be done before professions and businesses lay open to men and women on equal terms, and that the only people who could do that work were the young women themselves. So they decided to try and form a Junior Branch.

Warned by the experiences of other societies they decided that a mere Junior Branch would not be attractive so they offered real independence to their proposed Junior Council and did not even lay down any rights or conditions of membership. They invited twenty-three young women to meet and discuss the project and offered them premises, money for organisation and a free hand. Then they stood back and left them to it.

The Junior Council took up the challenge and developed according to its own ideas. After a year it voluntarily adopted the same objects as the Society and accepted the proposal that membership of the Junior Council should automatically carry with it membership of the Society. It developed its scheme of monthly parties; its recreational side, and subsequently its Group system, and at every stage has taken its own decisions and managed its own affairs.

This report of its ninth year of work shows the measure of its success.

### Monthly Parties.

Foreign politics and international affairs, as was inevitable in the present year, have figured largely in the programme of the Junior Council. In April last, a most interesting debate took place between Professor Harold Laski, M.A., and Major Yeats-Brown, D.F.C., on the motion that "Fascism is incompatible with free speech." The Hall was packed with an enthusiastic audience, including a number of Fascists, and not the least interesting part of the evening was the rapid fire of questions and replies after the speeches. Following this, a questionnaire was drawn up on the position to be given to women in the proposed Fascist State; this was sent to the Fascist Headquarters and received a full and detailed reply.

In October we were fortunate in securing Sir Norman Angell to speak on "Pacifism and National Defence." The Hall was crowded to hear one of the finest speeches made at a Junior Council party.

The following month, Mr. Geoffrey Crowther of the *Economist* was our Guest. He gave his talk the provocative title of "Britain—the Pharisee?" Many members and their friends listened with keen interest to the development of his theme and a good discussion followed Mr. Crowther's speech.

A party on a subject of special interest to women took place in December, when Miss E. A. Ford of the Board of Education took as the title of her speech "Equal Pay—ought we to have it and how can we get it?" Miss Ford set out to show how inequality of pay is not only essentially unfair, but also leads, in effect, to blackleg labour. She explained the situation as it is to-day in the Civil Service and showed how much there is to do.

In January last, when all interest was focussed on the Saar question, a party was held at which Mr. Horsfall Carter, of the New Commonwealth, spoke on the International Police Force, under the title of "The Saar Force and its significance."



February 1935 brought an extremely interesting meeting when Lord Lothian spoke to us on "Proposals for constitutional changes in India." Lord Lothian made a forceful, authoritative and amusing speech. The Hall was crowded with members and their friends and many distinguished guests. Mrs. Oliver Strachey was in the Chair and a most successful evening was enjoyed.

During the year a new development has been the institution of quarterly sherry parties for new members to make the personal acquaintance of the Executive Committee and officials of the Groups.

In addition to these general parties the Groups, into which the Junior Council is divided, have held many interesting meetings.

#### **Arts & Letters Group.**

The Arts & Letters Group was fortunate to secure Miss Eileen Thorndike, Director of the Embassy School of Acting, to speak on "Training for the Stage and after" in April last—Miss Thorndike gave an illuminating and valuable address and the Chair was charmingly taken by Miss Nancy Russell-Smith, herself an actress. "Design in Modern Homes" was chosen as the subject of the autumn party with Miss J. G. Ledebøer, A.R.I.B.A. in the Chair, and speeches from:—

1. Miss Lupton, Head of the Housing Centre, on the history of housing and slum clearance.
2. Miss J. Abram, A.M.I.P.I. on Town Planning.
3. Mrs. Anthony Pott, A.R.I.B.A. on Design of tenements and flats.

Mrs. Pott brought a model exhibit of a nursery school designed by herself and Mrs. Shepherd, A.R.I.B.A.

Since Christmas, two parties have been held, one in January, when Mrs. Alice Campbell (author of *Juggernaut*, *Desire to Kill*, etc.) spoke on "Crime Psychology" to a deeply interested audience, and another in March when Mr. John Wedgwood, Secretary to the famous firm, made a delightful speech on "China—the designer and the manufacturer." The Chair was most ably taken by Miss Constance Prescott, M.B.E. The Members' Room was crammed on this occasion and a number of distinguished guests, including Mr. C. L. Stocks, a member of the Board of Trade Council for Art in Industry, were present. Mr. Wedgwood brought some fascinating examples of china manufactured by his firm, which were greatly admired by the audience.

#### **Commerce and Business Group.**

In June the Commerce & Business Group was instrumental in organising two very interesting parties—the first being in the nature of a lecture given by two young Austrians travelling through Europe with a sound film, entitled "Austria at work and play." This gave members a splendid opportunity to hear of the beauties of this delightful country and to see pictures which made them all register a vow to go there as soon as possible. The second party which was on "Advertising at home and abroad" with speakers from Austria, Canada, France, Germany, and Great Britain, owed much of its success to the indefatigable work of Miss Hanbury Hopkins, Chairman of the Commerce Group, whose untiring efforts during the year have contributed so largely to the success of the functions organised by the Group.

Other Commerce Group meetings have included in October short speeches from experts on various careers for women, including dental surgery, hospital almoner, house property management, laundry management, openings for women in Gas Companies, and the manipulation of the Stenotype machine. In February, the Group collaborated with the Executive Committee in arranging a party at which Dr. Hugh Dalton, Reader in Economics, University of London, spoke in the Hall on "Foreign Dictatorships and the danger of war." The audience were much impressed by the speaker's masterly handling of the subject.

#### **Law Group.**

The Law Group organised a series of discussions earlier in the year somewhat in the nature of a Study Circle, one of which, entitled "Psychology in Court" was especially interesting. They wound up the year with a visit from Miss Lilian Barker, who spoke on her work as Governor of H.M. Borstal Institution for Girls at Aylesbury in the most inspired way to a deeply interested and sympathetic audience. The Group wish to congratulate Miss Barker on her recent appointment as Assistant Commissioner of Prisons, although everyone realises what a severe blow her retirement will be to the Borstal Institution. The Law Group is full of ideas for future development and subjects for parties, but the details must not be touched upon here, as they belong to next year's record of activities.

#### **Political Group.**

At their opening meeting the Political Group had the good fortune to secure Miss Cicely Hamilton to speak on the Soviet Union soon after her return from Russia. In the



course of her speech Miss Hamilton made several allusions to her book *Modern Russia* which had just been published. A very interesting discussion followed Miss Hamilton's speech: she answered with the utmost patience and forbearance the many questions fired at her by the audience.

In May, the international aspect was maintained by a speech from Miss Susan Lawrence (Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Health, 1929-31) on the "American Experiment." Miss Lawrence, like Miss Hamilton, had recently visited the country under discussion, and was, therefore, in a position to speak from fresh personal knowledge and observation; members voted this a most illuminating address.

A later party dealt with the question of the "Betting and Lotteries Bill" when the Group had as their guest and speaker Lady Emmott, J.P., a member of the Royal Commission on Lotteries and Betting, 1932-33. A good number of men and women were at this party, and if there were those present who would regret the curtailment of liberty likely to be imposed by the passing of the Bill into Law, they gave no inkling of their feelings.

In March, members and friends of the Political Group met for an informal discussion on the conversations held between H. G. Wells and Stalin in Moscow. They came armed with copies of the Wells-Stalin pamphlet, a record of the Conversations, with the comments of such well-known people as Bernard Shaw, J. M. Keynes, and Ernst Toller, and to the conclusions of these authorities added their own varied opinions.

#### **Science Group.**

The members of the Science Group were honoured in May by a visit from Dr. Karen Stephen, who spoke to them on the extraordinarily interesting subject of the "Psychology of the Unconscious" with Miss Theodora Alcock (by profession a psycho-therapist), in the Chair. Dr. Stephen, whose books on medical psychology are so well-known, gave an absorbingly interesting speech and was bombarded with questions from an audience which found it difficult to let her go.

June appeared to the members to be a month when scientific research should be conducted out-of-doors and consequently, through the courtesy of Clare College, Cambridge, a pass was secured for a visit to Wicken Fen, an area preserved as a sanctuary for birds, butterflies (swallow-tail and large copper butterflies, almost extinct elsewhere) and wild fen life. Miss Newstead, the Hon. Secretary of

the Group, organised a fleet of cars, owned by members and an enthusiastic party was formed one Sunday. Picnic lunch was taken and the expedition was crowned with a perfect summer day.

In November Mrs. Boyd-Watt offered to come and talk about "London Birds" and brought slides to illustrate her fascinating talk. Encouraged by the success of their Christmas party for grown-ups the previous year, the Science Group determined to try the experiment of giving a children's party in January: and again the energetic Secretary set to work, to plan a programme which would appeal to young friends of the Group—starting with a cinema show in the Hall, followed by tea and crackers, and winding up with games, dancing and the distribution of balloons.

#### **Social Work Group.**

The Social Work Group also took housing as their subject at a meeting in April, when Miss Liepmann spoke on "Housingschemes on the Continent and in England" and gave comparisons between the planning being carried out in the respective European countries. Miss D. G. Crewe, a Surveyor member of the Junior Council, took the Chair and led the discussion which followed Miss Liepmann's speech. A later meeting was addressed by Mr. Aubrey T. Westlake, B.A., M.R.C.S., who has taken such a great part in the organisation of the Grith Fyrd Camps for Unemployed Men. He astonished his hearers by the account he gave of the amazing development of the men after a short sojourn in the Camps and demonstrated very clearly their value in the life of the community.

#### **Walkers' Club.**

The outstanding event of the past year was the all night ramble in London. Two parties of about fifteen members were formed, one of which met at Broadcasting House, where the party attended a variety entertainment in one of the studios. After meeting the other party, for supper at Marsham Street, they went to the *Daily Telegraph* building and visited every department of that vast organisation. The Clerkenwell Telephone Exchange, the G.P.O., the Gas Light & Coke Co.'s premises at Nine Elms, and lastly Covent Garden at 6 a.m. were visited and the expedition wound up with breakfast at Women's Service House. The other party varied the programme by going to Battersea Power Station, *The Times* building, and London Wholesale Dairies at Vauxhall, where four miles of milk pipes may be seen! In addition to this adventure members of the Club who had not been able to



go to Broadcasting House that evening were invited to make a tour of inspection of the Building, and about fifteen members availed themselves of this offer. The Walkers' Club have also arranged many interesting walks on Sundays in the Home Counties.

### **Marsham Street Players.**

The Marsham Street Players have given two performances during the last season. The first on Wednesday, 14th November, when two one-act plays were performed, "Afternoon" by Philip Johnson and "The Bride" by Gertrude Jennings. There was only a moderate attendance at this performance, and for the first time the Society suffered a small loss on one of its productions. It was decided to enter the second of these two plays for the Drama League Festival, and on February 7th the same cast did it at the Grafton Theatre. Out of sixty-four entries it is very gratifying to know that our team was placed eighth and the Adjudicator in her report said "This team achieved a standard of light comedy acting rarely found among amateur players. The characterisation and team work were good throughout, as were also the tempo and grouping. The small stage was skilfully managed and the arrangement of props gave a splendid atmosphere and at the same time presented a good picture. . . . The team are to be heartily congratulated on a most entertaining performance."

The Spring performance took place on March 27th, when a three-act play "The Distaff Side" by John van Druten, was performed. This time the services of a professional producer were engaged, and the cast benefited very appreciably by the assistance of Mr. Arthur Ewart of the Lena Ashwell Players. The Millicent Fawcett Hall was practically full for this performance, which produced a profit.

During this season it was decided to inaugurate a scheme of Subscriber Membership of the Marsham Street Players, each Subscriber paying 10/- a year and receiving two seats for each of the shows. This scheme has already been well launched, but we are anxious to increase the number of Subscriber Members as well as acting members.

The Marsham Street Players propose to wind up the season with a dinner on Friday, May 17th, followed by a visit to the Old Vic.

### **Swimming Club.**

During the past year the Committee have organised various competitions, in addition to the challenges for the three Cups previously presented to the Club. These com-

petitions included a "Starting and Turning" event, won by Miss Mannington; a Back-stroke race, won by Miss Gatey; and a "Summer Lengths" competition, won by Miss Hindley. The latter event continued throughout the summer season, Miss Hindley, the winner, swimming 116 lengths of the small bath during May, June, and July. A similar event is in progress for the winter months.

The winners of the challenge Cups were as follows:— For improvement in the summer season—Miss Mannington; For Diving—Miss Mannington; For Handicap Race—Miss Irving.

Miss V. M. Newman was once again kind enough to attend at the small bath in May, June, and July to coach members in Diving and this opportunity for receiving first-class assistance was much appreciated by the Club.

Four matches with other clubs were arranged for the summer season but unfortunately owing to illness and holidays three of these had to be scratched. The remaining match, held at the home bath, against the Federation of Girls' Clubs, was lost. It is felt that the Club missed the support of their Captain, Miss Henderson, and previous Vice-Captain, Miss Brook, both of whom were unable to swim throughout last year owing to illness. It is hoped that they will both be able to take an active interest in the Club this summer.

### **Public Work Sub-Committee.**

The Junior Council shares in the general work of the Society through the Public Work Sub-Committee of the main Executive which keeps a constant watch over the interests of women, particularly in regard to matters affecting their economic position. This Committee has been actively occupied during the year with the appointment of women to posts in various Government Departments, e.g., the Board of Education, the Home Office, the Ministry of Transport and the Unemployed Assistance Board; with the Opening of the Diplomatic and Consular Services to women; with the employment of women police; with the position of married women as regards employment, nationality rights and legal status generally; with the working of the Shop Acts, and with other such matters. It has taken part in the stand of British women for the Indian Women's Franchise, it has followed the position of women in Germany and has joined in the international movement for raising the status of women through the League of Nations. It has worked also in various ways towards the goal of equal pay for equal work and towards obtaining for women in industry an approach to



that measure of free opportunity which has been won by women in the professions.

### **Final Remarks.**

In presenting this report to the members of the Junior Council, the Executive Committee experiences a keen sense of satisfaction that the activities of the past year have kept up to the standards set in previous years, and desires to thank all those members, especially the Chairman, Secretaries and Committees of Groups, Marsham Street Players, Swimming and Walkers' Clubs, for the indefatigable way in which they have worked to secure such excellent results. No one realises more fully than the Executive Committee how difficult it is for busy professional and business women to find time for participation in the affairs of a Society such as this, and appreciates most warmly the loyal co-operation of all those members who have contributed so largely to the success of the many and varied functions held during the past year.

The Committee takes leave, with great regret, of its Hon. Treasurer, Miss C. G. Gatey, whose term of office comes to an end. They wish to thank Miss Gatey for keeping the accounts so efficiently for the past five years, for her insistence on the economical expenditure of the very limited funds and for her unflinching attendance at all Committee meetings. Her place will be taken by Miss M. H. Pearson, who has been elected unopposed. They record also their gratitude to Miss Mackay and Mrs. Knollys for their invaluable services during their term of office as members of the Committee.
