Dear Madam,

Owing to our possessing
an entertainment hall here,
and my being a keen Women's
Suffragist, I have been
approached and am
anxious to have a meeting
early in March at 3.30 p.m.,
but am in some difficulty
with regard to speakers.

The Women's Social and

Political Union wrote and offered to send me two speakers and asked that they might collect for their funds. Miss Pankhurst told me she would come, and Mrs Elmy writes that she could secure Mr & Mrs Philip Snowden. Mrs MacLaren, out of loyalty to Lady Carlyle, says she could not, as a Liberal, speak on the same plat-

form as Miss Fankhurst,
and I am doubtful myself
whether the Women's Social
and Political Union speakers
will not be too "strong" for
the audience. At the same
time, it is to rouse the
apathy in the neighbour-
hood that I am having
this meeting, and I want
strong exponents, to create
enthusiasm. Mrs MacLaren
suggested that I should

ask your advice, and that must be my apology for thus troubling you.

I am not definitely pledged to any speakers yet, but I have written and asked Mrs Creighton to take the chair. Our hall will seat 400 comfortably and I think I can be sure of filling it. I would send out cards and give tea down-stairs at the conclusion of the meeting.

I propose to keep the meeting free from all party politics
