Constitution and Rules.

I.—The East Midland area shall include the following Counties and districts : Notts., Leicestershire, Rutland, Northants, Derbyshire (exclusive of the High Peak Division), Lincolnshire (exclusive of the Great Grimsby, Brigg, Spalding and Boston Divisions), and the Burtonon-Trent Division of Staffordshire, and any further district which shall be agreed upon by the East Midland Federation ; and that all Branches within the Federation area that may be affiliated to the National Union of W.S.S. shall be represented upon the Committee.

II.—That the Honorary Officers of the Federation shall be Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary and Secretaries, to be elected annually by the Federation Council. The Committee shall have power to fill up vacancies which may occur during the year.

III.—That the Committee consist of (1) The Officers of the Federation (Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer); (2) Representatives of the Branches to the number of one representative for 100 members or under, and one for each succeeding 100 or part of 100.

IV.—That the East Midland Federation Council meetings shall be held annually in different towns, by invitation.

V.—That Special Meetings of the Federation Council may be called by the Committee, and shall be called at any time, at the request of not less than one-third of the Societies within the Federation.

VI.-That Societies be entitled to send members to the Annual or Special Meetings of the Federation Council as follows :

and One Representative for each additional 50 members.

VII.—That each Society within the Federation pay an affiliation fee of Is. in the fI reckoned on annual subscriptions of not less than Is. as shown in the last Annual Report, with a minimum of 5s.

VIII.—That the expenses of an organiser be paid by the Society for whom she is working, but that her fares be paid out of the funds of the Federation.

IX.—That the Committee Meetings be held usually at Nottingham, or at some other place within the Federation which is easily accessible to all the Societies, but that the Officers have power to call a Committee Meeting elsewhere, it if seems desirable.

X.—That the individual Societies within the Federation shall retain their local authority, and that no work be undertaken by the Federation, in any locality, without the approval of the local Branch of the N.U.W.S.S.

REPORT, 1911-12.

At the Annual Meeting of the Midland Federation, held in Nottingham, in June, 1911, it was decided to divide the area into three separate Federations, and the Eastern portion then became the East Midland Federation.

A preliminary meeting was held in June, and some work was done during July and August in the way of a Caravan Tour in outlying districts. But it was not until October, 1911, that the actual formation of the Federation took place, its Officers elected, and its Constitution drawn up.

Since that time there has been a year of very strenuous work, and considerable achievement. The number of Societies in the area in October, 1911, was eight, and there are now sixteen. The Federation has started eight entirely new ones, and several of these are already in a most flourishing condition. Southwell and Hucknall (Nottingham's Branch Societies) have also this year affiliated direct to the National Union and the Federation.

The Committee view with no small satisfaction this substantial increase of Societies within the area, as, owing to the wide extent of country covered by the Federation, and the fact that many constituencies are County and Conservative ones, the work has been peculiarly difficult—no previous education on the Suffrage question having hitherto been attempted in many of the districts.

There have been two Bye-elections in the last six months, and these have made calls upon the local workers which were eagerly responded to, and gave increased opportunity for the spreading of knowledge to those districts which was invaluable.

One of the chief features of the work of the year has been the organising of deputations to Members of Parliament. These all took place early in the year, before the debate on the Conciliation Bill. They were held in London and in the Constituencies, and wherever possible a Memorial from the Constituency, and letters from private individuals were sent as well.

Out of the 36 M.P.'s representing the area, deputations were arranged to 12. Ten others were written to asking that one might be received, but these declined, either on the ground that it was useless, or quite unnecessary. Seven M.P.'s who are hopeless "Anti's" were not approached at all, as it was felt that other work was likely to be more effective at the moment.

The Burton Society arranged two deputations; the Derby Society three; Notts. three; and Crick one. Five others were arranged for the Hon. Secretary.

A statement of the voting in the House of Commons in March will be found elsewhere, and it will be seen that only one member recorded his vote in opposition to a pledge given.

Due notice was taken in the local press and elsewhere, of this betrayal of trust, and Mr. Crawshay-Williams, M.P. has since stated that his action was taken as a protest against militant agitation, and that having made that protest, he was now prepared to support us again as he had done in the past.

The Memorial work done during the year has been most valuable, and it is hoped that many Branches will take advantage of the offer of help from the National Union in carrying out this work, and will organise during the autumn really influential Memorials to their members. A very strong Memorial was prepared in Grantham and presented to Sir A. Priestley, M.P. Melton and Peterborough have each done something too with regard to this work ; and Kettering is at the moment preparing an electors' Memorial which will in due course be presented to Mr. Chiozza Money, M.P.

Many meetings have been held throughout the Federation during the year, and much organising carried out in connection with them.

Mrs. Fawcett has very kindly visited us twice, and spoken at three public meetings on each occasion. We are deeply grateful for her help. Lady Frances Balfour has also spoken for us on two occasions, and there are many others whom we would like to thank if room allowed, i.e., Miss I. O. Ford, Miss Stirling, Mrs. Stanbury, Mrs. Manners, and Mrs. W. E. Dowson, etc. Also the organisers who have worked so strenuously on our behalf, Mrs. Renton and Mrs. Cowmeadow, Miss Beaver and Miss Ballentine, and Mr. Wyllie, for kindly auditing the accounts.

The Committee also wish to thank Mr. Poyntz-Wright in the name of the Federation, for the designing, and to a great extent, the carrying out of the very beautiful new Federation Banner, which may be borrowed by the Societies for decoration at meetings, and which is extremely ornamental. The Burton Society also kindly assisted in the work of its completion.

The Secretary wishes to remind the Branches, in conclusion, that they would greatly assist the Nottingham Society, and incidentally serve the cause they all have at heart, if they would send orders for soap. The Nottingham Branch (which struggles nobly with a permanent deficit) endeavours to make at least its office expenses out of the sale of soap ; and as the Federation to some extent benefits through having a central office in Nottingham, it is hoped that Branches may see their way to sending orders from time to time, either privately or through the Branch Secretary, who in some cases arranges to keep a small store of soap for use of Suffragists !

Press Secretary's Report, 1911-12.

The Press work in the Federation has been done almost entirely by the Secretaries and Press Secretaries of the local Societies. All the Societies report that their local newspapers are willing to insert news, and are fair in their comments on the whole, even if they are unfavourable to the cause. Nottingham and Northampton are fortunate in having the local Press favourable on the whole, while Lincoln has to struggle with an unfavourable Press. In the other places, the local newspapers are either neutral or divided. The Burton Society are to be congratulated on having effected an improvement in the attitude of a hostile newspaper. The Mansfield Society have obtained the insertion in a local paper of a series of articles on the Women's Movement, written by some of their own members.

The work of the Federation Press Secretary has chiefly been to collect information from the local Societies, and to transmit to them the suggestions and recommendations of the National Union.

Treasurer's Report, 1911-12.

In spite of a balance on the right side at the bank, our Balance Sheet cannot be regarded with entire satisfaction. Out of an income of $\pounds 158$ 6s. 3d. only $\pounds 88$ 6s. 3d. has been raised within the Federation ; the remaining $\pounds 70$ has been made up by grants from the National Union. This Balance Sheet represents the first year of our existence, and we could hardly expect to be entirely self-supporting to begin with, but $\pounds 70$ is a large sum out of a little over $\pounds 150$. We must remember, too, that the N.U. pays the entire salary of our organiser, also the salary and expenses of an assistant organiser, items which do not appear in our accounts at all. Another point to be noticed is the large deficit in the Caravan Account, the donations towards the fund amounting to only f_4 8s. gd., and the expenses to f_{21} 18s. IId. Having involved ourselves in this considerable expense it behaves us to do all that we can to make it bear fruit. But unless we are prepared to send an organiser to continue the necessarily shallow spade-work done by the Caravan Tour, the soil which has been treated in so costly a fashion is likely to prove sterile.

The sum of 5s. 6d. on the receipt side needs explanation. The proceeds from the sale of literature have in reality been considerably larger than this, but the account books of new Branches alone can show it. To give grants of free literature to new and struggling Branches is one of the objects of the Federation.

It is to be hoped that all who possibly can will give generous support to the coming Bazaar. It will be easy to spend profitably during the next year every penny, however large a sum may be raised.


