EASTERN COUNTIES FEDERATION RULES.

1. NAME.—The name of the Federation shall be the EASTERN COUNTIES FEDERATION.
2. AREA.—The area of the Federation shall be the counties of Cambridgeshire, Essex (except the Parliamentary division of Walthamstow), Hertfordshire (except the Parliamentary division of W. Herts.), Huntingdonshire, Norfolk and Suffolk.
3. OBJECTS.—The objects of the Federation shall be:—
 - (a) To promote the formation of new Societies in its area.
 - (b) To perfect existing organisations.
 - (c) To arrange joint meetings, and generally to secure co-operation among Societies in its area.
4. COMMITTEES.—
 - (i) General Committee.—A General Committee shall be formed consisting of all members of the Executive Committee of the N.U.W.S.S. resident within the Federation area, and of a representative or representatives from each Society in the Federation. The representative members shall be chosen by the Societies within the Federation on the following basis:—

Societies with from 20—100 members shall be entitled to one representative.

Societies with from 100—200 members shall be entitled to two representatives.

Societies with over 200 members shall be entitled to three representatives.

Representative members shall be appointed for one year. If a representative is prevented from attending a meeting, the Committee of the Society she represents may choose a proxy to attend the meeting, the name of the proxy being sent to the Hon. Secretary of the Federation beforehand.

The General Committee shall meet at least once a year;

 - (a) to receive reports and balance sheet;
 - (b) to elect the officers of the Federation, to appoint two delegates to the Provincial Council and a representative on the Organisation Committee of the N.U.W.S.S.;
 - (c) to transact other business of which notice has been given to the Secretary of the Federation.

- (ii) Executive Committee.—An Executive Committee shall be formed, consisting of the Officers of the Federation and the County Secretaries. The Executive Committee shall meet four times a year (or oftener if required) to transact the general business of the Federation.
- (iii) County Sub-Committees.—Societies in each County shall form County Sub-Committees, consisting of two or more members of each Society in the County, to meet when required to elect County Secretaries and organise Suffrage work in the County in conjunction with the County Secretary.

5. FINANCIAL.

- (a) Each Society shall be responsible to the Federation for a certain sum per annum, the amount to be agreed upon by the Society in consultation with the Federation Treasurer.
- (b) The financial year shall begin on January 1st.
- (c) The accounts of the Federation shall be audited annually by an auditor appointed by the General Committee.

6. Any persons wishing to join the N.U.W.S.S. and not being within reach of a Society, may be enrolled as Federation members, with a minimum annual subscription of 1s.

7. The travelling expenses of delegates attending meetings of the General Committee shall be pooled.

FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EASTERN COUNTIES FEDERATION.

January 1st to December 31st, 1914.

THE Annual Report for 1914 is hard to write. For the first seven months of the year we pursued our Suffrage propaganda with ever-increasing zeal and success. The last five months have seen the whole country plunged into the unprecedented disaster of a European War, and all political questions have been for a time submerged in the general cataclysm. The effect of the war has been to make all the work of the first seven months seem as if it belonged to another age, while the future of the suffrage movement is wrapped in a cloud which no one can pierce. Two things affecting our cause stand out boldly: one is the way in which women of all classes and all shades of thought have thrown themselves into relief work connected with the war; the Suffrage Societies have been prominent in their work for unemployed women and girls, for infants and their mothers, for Belgian refugees, for soldiers' wives, and for soldiers themselves. Women have taken their right place with men on the committees—both central and local—which have been set up by the Government for dealing with distress, and in general have not only worked with their hands, but have taken their full share of responsibility in organisation. And in the second place there comes at this time a more complete realisation than ever before of how much the world needs the combined forces of both men and women in the ordering of national and international affairs. The women of each nation to-day are standing loyally by their men folk, and are strengthening them for the fray to the best of their power, but surely the hopes of suffragists are fixed upon a higher service still, and that is that they may work as citizens together with men for the establishment in future of a settled and lasting peace throughout the civilized world.

We give a brief report of the events of the year in the Federation, but have decided, from motives of economy, to omit the reports from the different Societies.

Constitution.

The Eastern Counties Federation began the year by making a change in its Constitution. This consisted of the appointment of an Hon. Secretary for each County within the area. These new officers act as assistants to the Hon. Secretary of the Federation, both by organising the Suffrage work in each County and at the same time serving to keep it in close touch with Federation Headquarters.

Area.

During 1914, the Lincolnshire Societies (Boston and Spalding), have been withdrawn from the Federation, and added to the South Midlands Federation. While regretting the loss of any Societies, the Committee felt that the new arrangement was geographically more convenient. On the other hand, the Romford division of Essex has been handed over to the Federation by the London Society.

Change of Officers.

At the Annual Meeting, held in January, the resignation of Mrs. Kellett, after three years of devoted service as Hon. Secretary, was received with much regret. Mrs. Vulliamy was appointed in her place.

At the end of October, Miss Creak felt obliged to resign the position of Organising Secretary, owing to the suspension of Suffrage work throughout the Federation. The Committee received this decision with the utmost regret, but they are glad to record that Miss Creak has consented to act for the present as Assistant Hon. Secretary, and they hope that she may one day resume her old post, in which she has done such invaluable work for the Federation.

Committees.

The General Committee has met twice during the year, in January and October, and the Executive Committee twice, in April and July. All the meetings were held in Cambridge. In January, schemes of work for the coming year were discussed; in October, reports were received from Societies of the work done since the outbreak of war. The meetings of the Executive Committee were mainly occupied with arrangements for Organisers, and with the Coast Campaign.

Each County also formed its own Committee, which dealt with special undertakings in its own area. These Committees have met from time to time when necessary.

Societies.

The number of Societies in the Federation is now thirty-nine. The Societies at Diss, Thetford and Aldeburgh are in abeyance, while new Societies have been formed at Beccles, Woodford, South East Essex, Romford and Harlow and Sawbridgeworth.

The Lowestoft Demonstration.

In April the Annual Conference of the N.U.T. was held at Lowestoft. The Federation seized the opportunity thus presented of placing the cause of Women's Suffrage before this large and important body. The Societies in the Federation were urged to hold meetings for teachers, and a special leaflet, pressing the claims of our cause upon the N.U.T., was printed and widely circulated. A shop was taken at a very central spot in Lowestoft for a fortnight; on April 14th we had a procession, headed by Mrs. Fawcett and the Federation banner, from the Suffrage shop to the theatre, where a public meeting was held. The theatre was crowded, and speeches were delivered by Mrs. Fawcett, Sir Victor Horsley and Miss Muriel Matters. On the same evening a reception was given by the Lowestoft Society, which was attended by a large number of teachers. Lady Horsley and Mrs. Rackham gave addresses, and Miss Matters a recitation. The success of the demonstration was largely due to Miss Waring. Splendid work was also done by the Lowestoft Society under Mrs. Ponder, and by some members of the Norwich Society.

Bye-Election.

A bye-election took place at Ipswich in May. All the Organisers at work in the Federation were summoned to Ipswich for the bye-election, but the whole work and responsibility was undertaken by headquarters.

Suffrage Market in Cambridge.

On July 14th, the Cambridge Society held a Suffrage Fair in the Market Place and Corn Exchange, in aid of the Federation funds. Huge quantities of clothing and furniture, kitchen utensils, pictures, books, and jewellery (all both old and new), were sent to the sale by friends in Cam-

bridge and district. Especial thanks must be given to Mrs. Kennedy, who gave a quantity of valuable china and pictures, and *objets d'art*, the majority of which were sold at Mrs. Vulliamy's house before the Fair. The old clothing was on sale in the Corn Exchange, and the rest of the things on the usual stalls in the Market Place. Great interest was aroused by the Fair, and a sum of over a hundred and thirty pounds was realised.

Coast Campaign.

The great piece of work for the summer of 1914, was to have been the Coast Campaign. The plan was to work the coast from Hunstanton to Southend, during the months of July, August and September. Our Organisers were to be in charge of different sections, and very many offers of help had been received. It was hoped that open-air meetings would be held, and literature distributed in every coast resort, during the summer season. The campaign started on July 15th at Hunstanton, where Miss Harris was in charge. She held meetings at Lynn, Hunstanton, Snettisham and Heacham. Miss Villiers (Stevenage), and Mrs. Fyffe (London), also gave valuable help. Miss Waring made a start at Cromer, where meetings had been arranged for August 3rd and 4th. Miss Creak had made arrangements for Essex: Miss Garlick was to be the Organiser in charge, and was herself at Colchester when war broke out. A meeting had been arranged at Clacton for August 5th. All these preparations were of course instantly cancelled on the outbreak of war. There is no doubt that such a campaign offers unrivalled opportunity for Suffrage propaganda, and we earnestly hope that we may be able to resume our operations in other and happier times.

Organisers.

Miss Creak.

Miss Creak's work has been mainly in Essex, as she acts as Secretary for that County. During the year, four new Societies have been started in Essex: South East Essex, Romford, Woodford and Harlow and Sawbridgeworth. The last three Societies are all keen, vigorous, and a great source of strength to the Federation. Maldon Society has ceased to maintain a separate existence, and its members are merged in N.E. Essex. Colchester has left the Union, as it feels unable to support the bye-election policy. Miss Creak has also worked at Bishop's Stortford, where a large

public meeting was addressed by Lady Frances Balfour; at Bury St. Edmunds, where Mrs. Heitland addressed a very successful open-air meeting, and Mrs. Rackham a garden meeting; at Southend, where she helped Miss Cohen to form a society; at Dunmow, where Mrs. Bethune-Baker and Mr. Mirrlees addressed a meeting in the Town Hall; at Epping, where Miss Ruth Young addressed a very successful open-air meeting; at Stebbing and Felstead where Mrs. Vulliamy spoke; and at Lakenheath. In the case of the last four, this was the first Suffrage meeting which had been held in these places. Miss Creak addressed meetings at Epping (Women's Co-operative Guild), Letchworth (I.L.P.), Harpenden, Harwich, Cambridge (Women's Co-operative Guild), Woodford, Halstead and other places in N.E. Essex, Welwyn (Mothers' Meeting), Sheringham, Ramsey, Brentwood, and Romford.

Miss Waring.

Miss Waring spent the earlier part of the year in Eye, Lowestoft and Stowmarket divisions, assisted by Miss Frost and Miss Scott; several very good meetings were held. One result of her work was seen in the formation of a new Society at Beccles, while the Lowestoft and Stowmarket Societies were greatly strengthened. After the Ipswich bye-election, Miss Waring was, to the great regret of all who knew her, withdrawn from the Eastern Counties Federation. This was necessitated by changes in the arrangements of the N.U. staff of Organisers. Her place, as Head Organiser in the Federation, was taken by Miss Harris, who devoted the first part of her time in the Federation to the Mid-Herts division, where she visited Harpenden and St. Albans. Miss Harris also went to King's Lynn and spoke at a members' meeting.

Miss Cohen.

Miss Cohen was with the Federation from January to Easter. She spent some weeks in the Tilbury division of Essex, mainly at Southend, where she arranged a meeting for Mrs. Corbett Ashby, among other smaller meetings, and also took and won a Suffrage Debate. Miss Cohen also visited Westcliffe, Leigh, Rayleigh, Rochford, Benfleet, and Shoeburyness. Miss Cohen stayed some time in Romford, and organised a series of open-air meetings; it was largely due to her efforts that we now have a flourishing Society in that town.

Miss Power.

Miss Power was in the Federation for some weeks in June and July. She spent a week in Hunts with Miss Staley, and then went to Saffron Walden and did much good work, but it has not yet been possible to found a Society there. Miss Power also spent a week in the neighbourhood of Dunmow.

Miss Garlick

Miss Garlick worked in Cambridgeshire during the month of May; she organised very successful meetings at Whittlesea, Chatteris, Wisbech and Littleport, and gained many new members.

Mrs. Rackham

Mrs. Rackham has spoken during the year at Bocking, Rayne, Brentwood, Bishop Stortford, Eye, Bury St. Edmunds, Stowmarket, Cambridge, Whittlesea, Woodford, St. Ives, Girton College, Cromer, Littleport, Fordham, Hunstanton, Lakenheath, Ramsey, Romford, Hertford, Letchworth, Hitchin, Knebworth and Harlow.

Since the outbreak of war, we have had no Organisers at work in the Federation. It was felt that it was wise to husband our resources in preparation for the time when we were able to resume full Suffrage activities. The office at 71, Panton Street, has been given up, and the literature and properties of the Federation are now housed at 18, Hobson Street. But though we have no recent activities to report which have been actually undertaken by the Federation itself, we have abundant evidence of the activities of the Societies in all departments of the war relief work.

Work of Societies.

Reports have been received by the Federation Secretaries which show that Societies have been engaged in the following ways:—

- Hospitality to the Belgian Refugees.
- Girls' Clubs.
- Refreshment Tents for Soldiers.
- Making and collecting Clothing for distribution, and comforts for Soldiers.
- Clubs for Soldiers' Wives.
- Teaching Shirtmaking to Women and Girls.

Individual members of our Societies have almost everywhere been appointed on the local Relief Committees. Many are also working for the Red Cross.

At least two Societies have employed paid "Common Cause" sellers with good results.

Many of our Societies are co-operating with other Organisations in their localities, in various forms of relief work.

Press Work.

During the earlier part of the year, some effort was made to re-organise the Press Department of the E.C.F., and on April 25th, Miss Leaf (Hon. Press Secretary of the N.U.) kindly paid a visit to Cambridge, to meet as many local Press Secretaries as could be gathered together, and to explain the general lines on which N.U. Press work should be conducted. Societies were strongly urged to appoint their own Press Secretaries, and to arrange for the supervision of newspapers in their own areas. We feel some disappointment in recording that these recommendations have been carried out to a very limited extent, and it is obvious that the Press Department does not attract many of our workers in the Eastern Counties. However, some progress has been made, and the press-cuttings received during May, June and July, showed that local meetings were on the whole well reported, and that the papers were at length learning to distinguish between militant and non-militant methods. To editors who appeared to need particular instruction, we sent marked copies of the *Common Cause*. Some fourteen editors were asked if they would be willing to publish a definite amount of non-militant suffrage notes and news at stated periods, and the general reply was that they had "sufficient news of this kind through the ordinary news channels, amplified as they are by occasional contributions from local ladies connected with the movement." We trust the local ladies will see to it that their amplifications are frequent and full. It is clear that the essence of success in this department,

even more than in others, is persevering local work. Very few provincial papers care to deal with unknown contributors, and we feel very strongly that specialised local effort alone can make the Press as valuable an aid to our cause as it ought to be.

Since August there has naturally been but little activity, though we understand that many papers have given good accounts of the different enterprises of Societies in their own localities.

FINANCIAL REPORT.

Although our work was broken off in August, and receipts from that date have been practically *nil.*, the year has been financially very satisfactory. We begin 1915 with a balance of £104 13s. 1½d., or, in detail, £31 14s. 9d. in trust for certain of the Federated Societies, and £69 18s. 4½d. in Treasurer's custody, and £3 on loan, belonging to the Federation.

Our total income from receipts during the year was £315 7s. 11d., and our total expenditure for 1914 was £286 12s. 5½d.; on December 31st our outstanding liabilities amounted to £5.

This income, raised practically in seven working months, compares very favourably with the incomes of former years. It has to be remembered that there has been this year no popular campaign, corresponding to the Pilgrimage of 1913, to bring us in funds; the Coast Campaign, which promised to be profitable, was brought to an end by the war, just when it had involved us in a certain amount of expense, and before it had brought in receipts, and from the N.U.W.S.S. we received this year only £5 1s., that portion of the Mandate Fund, earmarked for the E.C.F., and £28 as a grant (for though the N.U. made a grant of £50 for the Coast Campaign, we returned £22). Our income then has been almost totally raised by subscriptions

and donations from individuals and Federated Societies. Donations from individuals amounted this year to £147 8s. 6d., as compared to £102 17s. 6d. in 1913. The best thanks of the Federation are again due to the anonymous friend whose generosity secured to it the services of Miss Creak as Organising Secretary up to the end of September last. Donations from Societies amounted to £103 8s. 2d. as compared to £94 6s. 2d. in 1913. This is most encouraging, revealing, as it does, the growth of the Federation, and the excellent co-operation between it and the Societies. It is full of promise for the future; the war must cause a pause in our work, but our power for work, our financial as well as personal power, is dormant only, and we can look forward with hope to the resumption of full activity.

It is impossible to speak of the financial support rendered by the Federated Societies, without mentioning the Cambridge Sale, a report of which will be found elsewhere. Over £130 was made by the sale; £30 of which was reserved for Cambridgeshire, and £60 most generously contributed to the Federation.

As to our income in the immediate future, it is too much to expect that it will not suffer a diminution, but we do ask our Societies not to forget us entirely. Our aim should be to meet the small but necessary expenses by new funds, not by drawing on our balance, so that when we resume our Suffrage work we shall be in as flourishing a condition as we are at the close of this year, 1914.

The hearty thanks of the Federation are due to Miss D. Martin Leake, for again auditing our accounts.
