PREFACE.

In the Report of 1895 issued by the Royal Commission on Secondary Education, the Association of University Women Teachers is quoted as one of the earliest women's organisations of Secondary Teachers. The Association was founded in January, 1883, on a suggestion made by the late Miss A. J. Clough, then Principal of Newnham College. Membership was from the outset limited to teachers who had received a University Education, and the growth and progress of the Association in its early days was entirely due to the thoughtful efforts of the founders, their insistence on a high standard, and their realisation of a common aim and interest and the sense of responsibility involved. Miss A. J. Clough was President of the Association from its foundation until her death in 1892.

Even at an early date the objects of the Association covered a large field, including discussions of educational questions, conferences with similar bodies, social meetings, etc., and the careful watching of the educational market, whilst providing Members with work as Lecturers, Teachers, Examiners and Inspectors. The success of the Association in its efforts to advise its Members and assist them to improve their status and remuneration is well known.

The Association has been incorporated as a "Company not for Profit Limited by Guarantee" under the Companies (Consolidation) Act, 1908, and since the incorporation its aims are set forth in much wider terms, more in accordance with the actual work done, *e.g.*, to promote the cause of education generally; to protect and improve the status, and to further the legitimate professional interests, of women teachers; to initiate and promote, or oppose, measures, legislative or administrative, in Parliament or elsewhere; to take part in, or send delegates to, meetings, conferences, etc.; to promote thrift among teachers, and to purchase or subscribe for the grant of annuities by any Assurance Company authorised to grant life annuities or pensions, etc., etc. While attending to these varied interests, the Association never loses sight of its special aim: to improve the status and standing of that section of the profession which it represents.

The Association consists of a President, Ordinary Members and Honorary Members. *Ordinary* Membership of the Association is limited to women teachers who are graduates of a University of Great

Britain or Ireland, or, in the case of Cambridge and Oxford, who hold a Degree certificate of these Universities.* Honorary Members are elected by the Committee under certain conditions, and these at present include Miss Emily Davies, LL.D., Mrs. Henry Sidgwick, LL.D., the Rt. Hon. Viscount Bryce of Dechmount, O.M., D.C.L., and Dr. Sadler, C.B., Vice-Chancellor of Leeds University. The affairs of the Association are administered by an Executive Committee of 12 Ordinary Members, and a President, elected by the Association. The latter may be either an Honorary or an Ordinary Member, and is elected annually; the retiring President is re-eligible, provided that no person shall be President for more than two consecutive years. The other officers are the Secretary and the Hon. Treasurer, who are appointed by the Committee, and have no seats on the Committee *ex officio*. The Members of Committee are arranged on a rota in three equal divisions, and in each year the division which has been longest in office retires. The Committee has power to appoint Sub-Committees, and to make, repeal, and alter, bye-laws for the conduct of the general affairs of the Association. The Articles of Association provide for a Business Meeting to be held once a year; also for Ordinary and Extraordinary General Meetings of Members. Meetings of the Executive Committee take place every month, or more often when deemed necessary.

There are 26 Honorary Members. In 1883 the number of Ordinary Members was 76; it is now 2828. These include Heads of University and Training Colleges, Head and Assistant Mistresses of Public and Private Schools, Inspectors, Lecturers, etc., who possess the University qualifications required for membership. The work has developed in many directions, as the perusal of the 34 Annual Reports of the Association will show. The statistics collected and published for the last eighteen years of the salaries obtained by Teachers through the help of the Association, have served many a useful purpose in various Educational Conferences. The Office is frequently referred to by Education Authorities and Teachers for information and advice on a great variety of matters, such as Agreements, Scales of Salaries, Sick Leave, payment during absence through illness, Pension Schemes, etc.

A few instances of action taken by the Association of University Women Teachers in the interests of education will best explain the

work it is doing. In 1888 the Association was instrumental in the formation of a Committee to investigate the low salaries paid at the time to Assistant Mistresses in Public Schools. The report of this Committee was followed by an address given to Members in General Meeting by Miss Clara Collet, now of the Board of Trade, on "Salaries of Women Teachers," which was reprinted in the "Journal of Education" in 1890. In 1890 the Association held a series of Discussion Meetings on the then contemplated Register for Teachers, in 1891 gave evidence before the Select Committee on the "Teachers' Registration and Organisation Bills" before Parliament, and in 1892 was invited by the Association of Head Mistresses to a Conference on the "Salaries Question." When the Secondary Education Bill was before Parliament the Association was represented at a Conference on "Secondary Education" convened by the University of Cambridge, and when the County of London opened its Secondary Schools the Association took part in a Conference called by the Assistant Masters' Association on "Salaries of London Secondary Teachers." On various occasions the Association has sent deputations to the Board of Education.

In 1912, in order to meet the needs of Members compelled to insure under the National Health Insurance Act, the Association in conjunction with other Associations of Secondary Teachers formed a Society approved by the Commissioners under the name of the "Secondary, Technical and University Teachers' Insurance Society." In 1913 the Association was affiliated to the "Imperial Union of Teachers."

Miss Alice Woods, late Principal of the Maria Grey Training College, is the President of the Association. The Registered Office of the Association is 108, Victoria Street, London, S.W.1.

THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Executive Committee have to report a slight decrease in the number of Members this year, *i.e.*, 2828 as against 2839 last year. This decrease is much less than was expected, as war-time conditions are bound to affect any Association, and the number of women entering the teaching profession this year is lower than usual. The number of new Members elected during the past year is 222, and 11 former Members have been re-elected.

The Executive Committee report with great regret the death (on 27th December, 1916) of *Mrs. Frank Malleson*, who had been for many years an Honorary Member of the Association. *Mrs. Malleson* founded the Working Women's College in Queen's Square in 1864; this was later re-modelled as the College for Working Men and Women and numbered among its lecturers such men as F. D. Maurice, Dean Stanley, William Morris, Sidney Colvin, and many others no less eminent. *Mrs. Malleson* was one of the first members of the London Society for Women's Suffrage, she also worked with *Mrs. Josephine Butler* for the repeal of the Contagious Diseases Act, and at the time of the Bulgarian atrocities in 1876 she organised relief work for the refugees who fled to Serbia; in this she was so efficient that the Serbian Government conferred upon her a decoration (addressed to *Mrs. Malleson*, London!) of the highest class of the Red Cross. Later, when she settled in Gloucestershire, *Mrs. Malleson* started a Rural Nursing Association, afterwards affiliated to Queen Victoria's Jubilee Institute for Nurses, and also took an active part in the organisation of classes under the Technical Education branch of the Gloucestershire County Council.

The Committee have also to record the deaths of *Miss Edith Woollacott*, B.A. London, on the 29th November, 1916; *Miss Elizabeth Peddie Steele-Hutton*, M.A. St. And., on the 5th January, 1917; *Miss Winifred Gurney Smith*, Cambridge, on the 25th February, 1917, and *Miss Gladys J. Cobbold*, Cambridge, on the 5th August, 1917.

The Executive Committee have met 11 times during the year and 16 Sub-Committee meetings have also been held. *Miss Chick*, who retires from the Executive Committee by rotation, is unable to stand for re-election as, owing to her approaching marriage, she will no longer be living in London. *Miss M. E. Fairbairns*, who was elected a member of the Executive Committee last year, has unfortunately been obliged to resign, as she has been appointed to a responsible position in The Women's Auxiliary Army Corps. *Miss Galloway* has resigned from the Sub-Committee for Elections, etc., owing to the difficulty of travelling from St. Albans to attend the Meetings.

The financial position of the Association continues to be quite satisfactory. The surplus carried to the Capital Account is slightly less than that of last year, as considerable additional expenditure was incurred by the necessity of moving the office, besides the increased

cost of stationery, etc. The £100 4½ per cent. War Loan Stock purchased in 1915 was converted into 5 per cent. War Loan Stock, and the holding made up to £150, and an additional £200 of 5 per cent. War Loan was added to the investments.

The Committee are glad to inform the Members that it has been arranged to hold, on January 12th, a meeting in conjunction with the Conference of Educational Associations, when an address on some educational subject will be given.

The Hospital Branch of the Association is now in working order. One Member was admitted for a serious operation, which was perfectly successful, and the excellence of the treatment and the comfort of the hospital left nothing to be desired. There are now 213 Members of the Hospital Branch and the Executive Committee hope that this number may be increased; since 200 is the minimum number of Members necessary for the support of a bed, the margin of 13 subscribers is rather small. Members are reminded that the bed supported, when not required for the use of Members of the Association, is used for other professional women who are unable to afford the expense of a nursing home.

The Committee are glad to report an increase in the number of Members taking out Pension Policies in the Clerical, Medical and General Life Assurance Society. They hope this increase will be maintained, as they consider this Pension Scheme to be most satisfactory. Inquiries should be made through the Secretary of the Association of University Women Teachers.

The work of the Secondary, Technical and University Teachers' Insurance Society continues to be quite satisfactory, the numbers are at present almost stationary.

Excellent work has been done by the Secondary School Teachers' War Relief Fund, details of which will be found in the Report which was sent to all Members of this Association in November, 1917.

The moving of the Office to 108, Victoria Street, S.W.1 was satisfactorily accomplished at the end of February, in spite of the difficulties caused by war-time conditions. The new premises, though not so light and airy as those in Cambridge Street, are very suitable and convenient, and many Members have expressed their great satisfaction at the more central position.

Many inquiries have been received this year with regard to salaries,

and the allocation of the increased Board of Education grant, and, the subject being of such great importance, a special Sub-committee was appointed to consider this question, together with other much needed reforms in Education. As a result the following recommendations were adopted and a copy of them sent to the President of the Board of Education:—

(a) With regard to the SALARIES OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN TEACHERS.

1.—That £130 is now the minimum living wage for an efficient teacher.

2.—That training should be regarded as a valuable asset which should be taken into consideration in fixing initial salaries.

3.—That women with University degrees or their equivalent should obtain an initial salary of £130 to £150 (without experience).

4.—(a) That salaries should be increased by increments of £10 per annum up to a minimum of £220.

(b) That these increments should be continued in all cases of entirely satisfactory service up to a minimum of £250.

(c) That salaries of Assistant Mistresses occupying positions of special responsibility should be on a still higher scale.

In all three cases the increase to be given on the recommendation of the Headmistress.

5.—That the minimum initial salary of a Headmistress should not be less than £400, and there should be provision for regular increment.

6.—That the value of residence should be reckoned at about £55 a year.

7.—That salaries for temporary posts should depend on qualifications and experience, but should not differ essentially from the rate of salary of a permanent mistress.

The above salaries are calculated on the presumption that non-contributory pensions will be provided.

(b) With regard to GENERAL REFORMS.

1.—That each Local Authority should be required to submit to the Board of Education a complete scheme of education for its area, together with its estimate of cost.

2.—That no person or persons should be permitted to carry on a school of any kind without a licence from the Board of Education.

3.—That since an adequate number of good teachers is necessary for the improvement of our educational system, the salaries and pensions provided should be such as will induce the best men and women available to enter and remain in the profession, with equal pay for equal service, and that the facilities for preparation for a teacher's career should be such as will enable intending teachers to pass through a period of study at a University.

4.—That pupils should be awarded free places in Secondary Schools, if they have given proof of real mental capacity and physical fitness, without reference to actual attainments.

5.—That there should be provision of an adequate number of scholarships of sufficient value to enable all pupils, with the necessary mental equipment, who may so desire, to enter a University.

6.—That it should be the concern of the Educational Authorities to provide facilities of conveyance to school for children living in remote districts.

7.—That there should be a regular and compulsory medical inspection of each pupil attending a Secondary School.

(c) With regard to SPECIAL REFORMS.

Place of Science in the Curriculum.

That in view of the value of Scientific Training, more time should be devoted to the teaching of Science: in order to make this possible without extending the school hours, the domestic economy group should be postponed until school leaving age, except in cases where such training forms a necessary part of the School Course.

University Examinations.

That no pressure should be put on girls to take Matriculation at 16 years of age.

That no student should be allowed to take a degree examination without having spent 3 years at a University.

In August, 1916, application was made to the London County Council for a licence to carry on the Registry of the Association, as it is against the regulations of the Council that this work should be done without a licence. By the time the licence was received, at the end of October, the Annual Report for 1915-1916 was in the printer's hands, and consequently the matter is recorded for the first time in this Report.

Miss Winifred Smith represented the Association at a Meeting of Women Clerks and Secretaries held at University College, on February 14th, on the question of the minimum salary which should be demanded by University Women. *Miss Clough* made a most interesting speech cordially agreeing with the principle of refusing inadequate pay, but pointing out some of the difficulties in fixing a minimum. *Miss Smith* spoke of the tendency among women to spoil their professional work by undertaking too many additional duties such as housekeeping, dress-making and even cooking and washing clothes. Most speakers agreed that it would be advisable to fix a minimum salary of £150 for women with a University degree, as a low rate of salary accepted by such women would affect not only themselves, but women clerks generally.

Mrs. Brough attended the meetings of the Education Sectional Committee of the National Union of Women Workers, at which the chief subjects discussed were the educational reforms suggested by the Workers' Educational Association, the Report of the Departmental Committee on Juvenile Education in relation to employment after the War, and the provisions of Mr. Fisher's Education Bill.

Mrs. Brough also attended the meeting of the Consultative Committee of the Students' Careers Association which was held at 5, Princes Street, Cavendish Square, on the 21st of November. *Miss Stephen* took the Chair and *Miss Fairbairns* made a most interesting report on the new openings for women, mentioning among other demands that for women opticians in provincial towns.

Two meetings of the societies affiliated to the National Union of Women Workers were held on the 29th of June and the 21st of September, and were attended by the *President* and *Mrs. Brough*; the outcome of these meetings was an urgency resolution as to the representation of Affiliated Societies on the Executive of the National Union of Women Workers, and the appointment of a Committee to revise its constitution. A further account of the details of this resolution will be found in the report of the Council Meeting of the National Union of Women Workers held in October, 1917.

(1) *The Annual Business Meeting, January 20th, 1917.*

The Thirty-third Annual Business Meeting of the Association was held on Saturday, January 20th, 1917, at University Hall, Gordon Square, at 2.45 p.m.

The President, *Miss Alice Woods*, took the Chair. Seventy-eight Members and some visitors were present. The Secretary gave notice of a series of three Social Meetings arranged by the Committee for Members of the Association during the Lent Term. She explained that it had not been possible to join the Conference of Educational Associations on account of its very early date in January. The Chairman read out the names of forty-five Members who by § 44 of the "Articles of Association" were not entitled to vote at the meeting, their membership being of less than six months' standing.

On the motion of *Miss Skeel* seconded by *Miss Atkinson Williams*, and passed by those present, the Minutes of the Annual Business Meeting held on January the 20th, 1916, were taken as read and signed by the Chairman.

The Chairman stated that there were two omissions in the Annual Report which might require some explanation. The first was in connection with the conference which *Miss Kilgour* had suggested to consider changes in girls' education. Owing to the difficulty of finding a suitable date, the conference had to be postponed until November and the report would consequently have to be deferred until next year's Annual Report. The second point was with regard to the licence from the London County Council for the registry work. The solicitors of the Association had been consulted and had advised the payment of the fee; the fee had therefore been paid and was entered in the Balance Sheet, but it had not been mentioned in the Report as the matter had not been settled before the manuscript was sent to the printers.

Miss Rachel Barrett moved and *Miss Atkinson Williams* seconded the adoption of the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts, and the Chairman informed the Meeting that the Report was now open for discussion and asked the Secretary to comment on certain points.

The Secretary mentioned that another Member holding the degree of a foreign University had been elected, and called attention to the increase in the number of Members 2839 as against 2776 the previous year. She was glad to say that the Hospital Branch was now in working order, and Members who wished to join might feel assured of receiving first-rate treatment. She reminded the Members that the Pension Scheme recommended by the Association was that offered by the Clerical, Medical and General Life Assurance Society. Members would be glad to hear that a good response had been made to the appeal sent out for the Secondary School Teachers' War Relief Fund, and *Miss Coward* had kindly undertaken to represent the Association on the Committee of Management. With regard to the Registry, the Report was most satisfactory, more posts had been filled than during the previous year and there was a marked improvement in the salaries offered to women teachers.

The Honorary Treasurer, *Miss Coward*, reported that the financial position of the Association was in a thoroughly satisfactory condition. During the last ten years the Association had been able to invest about £100 every year, so that the investments amounted to £1000—the sum which had been considered necessary to secure a really sound foundation. In addition to this, a sum of £200 had been placed on deposit in the National Provincial Bank of England. The year 1915-16

had been a particularly successful one. The appointment fees had been unusually high and the number of subscribers had increased. Expenses of working had also increased, but the surplus on the year had been £166, which was about £43 more than the surplus of the year before.

In the Secondary, Technical and University Teachers' Insurance Society, work had been going on very smoothly and regularly. The Triennial Valuation had not yet been made, but it was expected that when it was done, the Society would show the very sound state of its finances, and would probably be in a position to offer increased benefits to its Members in accordance with its original hopes and expectations.

In answer to various questions put by *Dr. White* as to whether the number of posts filled could be regarded as satisfactory, the Secretary explained that there had been a shortage of mistresses qualified in Science and Mathematics, and this had prevented the filling of many such posts. She also explained that it was impossible to send notices to Members other than those actually seeking work.

Other questions were asked as to the value of training as a qualification, and as to the granting of War Bonuses on equal terms to men and women. The Chairman promised that this latter question should be considered in Committee.

The Adoption of the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts was then put to the Meeting and carried unanimously.

On the motion of *Miss Strudwick* seconded by *Miss Winifred Smith* it was unanimously agreed:—

"That Mrs. Harold Cox be appointed Auditor for the year 1916-17, and receive the fee of £5 5s."

The Secretary read a letter from *Miss Stephen*, withdrawing her name from the candidature for Presidency of the Association, and announced that *Miss Alice Woods* had consented to hold office for another year.

The ballot for the election of Committee Members had resulted in the re-election of *Miss Bracken*, *Miss Coward* and *Miss Sandford*, and in the election of *Miss Fairbairns*.

The Chairman: "I have to thank the Association for the honour they have done me in re-electing me their President. I will do the work as well as I can during this coming year, and I very much hope that the Association will have the pleasure of welcoming *Miss Stephen* as President before very long."

PRESENTATION OF ADDRESS TO MISS GRUNER.

"I have now the pleasure of presenting to *Miss Gruner* the Address which the Association has so earnestly wished to give her. In presenting it I should like to say how strong the feeling is that the Association can never repay the debt it owes her for its establishment, position and progress. Again and again in the letters received from all parts with signatures for the Address, we hear how her services to individual Members extended far beyond her official duties and how all she has done for the Association cannot be too highly appreciated. 'Her help,' say the writers, 'was so unflinching and clear-sighted,' 'so unstinting,' 'so sympathetic,' her 'interest so personal,' and 'kindness itself.' Her work is described as 'so statesmanlike,' 'such an achievement in the world of women's work and of secondary teachers'; one of 'endless,' 'generous,' 'far-seeing devotion,' a 'great work to improve the position of University women teachers.'

It is *Miss Gruner* who has made this Association a strong educational force. She has cared for it and laboured for it with all the strength of her strong nature, and she has brought about a very different state of things from the time when first she took up the work. I am sure that I, as President, the Committee and the new Secretary all feel very strongly how difficult the task is of carrying on the Association without her guiding hand. We do mean to do our very best, however, and we look to each Member for help—for the help of confident expectation that we shall try to do our best for the Association and to carry out the aims put before us in the Articles of Association. We regard our duties very earnestly indeed. We must remember that this Association is in a certain sense unique, unlike many other Societies in which Members can just pay their subscription and then leave the matter altogether alone. Here each Member is able to help forward the work of the Association, which is something far beyond a mere registry office. The ways in which individual Members can help are numerous—in the first place by the punctual payment of subscriptions. People do not realise enough what a difference it would make in the work of the Office and what a difference in the expenditure of the Society, if they would pay their subscriptions promptly and regularly. It is no doubt a hard matter, but the observance of it would help the whole Association forward.

There is another way in which individual Members can help, by trying as far as possible to keep up to date in all educational reform, to keep in touch with educational progress, and, though it may seem a side issue, I take the liberty of mentioning two important new educational books lately published:—Professor Dewey's 'Democracy and Education,' and a book which has quite recently been written by Mr. Branford called 'Janus and Vesta.' The latter is one of the most striking educational books which have appeared for many years past.

Members can also help by protecting the interests of women teachers. They can help by bringing in new Members and they can help by remaining Members themselves in spite of the temptation to drop their subscriptions for the sake of war economy, and by undertaking to be representatives of the Association at conferences. The work of the Committee can be greatly assisted in this latter way.

Lastly Members can help by earnest effort to realise all our educational ideals, and such acts will be the best testimonial we can possibly offer to *Miss Gruner*, even though our appreciation take a concrete form. I will now read the Address we offer *Miss Gruner* to-day.

'DEAR MISS GRUNER,

'On your retirement from the Secretaryship of the Association of University Women Teachers we, the undersigned members, beg you to accept the assurance of our gratitude, respect and high regard.

'The Association was founded in January, 1883, to bind in one all University women engaged in the work of education. When the Association was Incorporated, these original aims were set forth with greater elaboration, but remained substantially the same, viz., the promotion of the intellectual, professional and personal welfare and interests of University women teachers, in order that they might play their due part in all national and municipal movements, legislative or administrative, for Education. In large measure, such a Society depended for its success on its first Secretary. Your insight and foresight concerning public affairs, your inflexible adherence to high ideals, your unwearied courage, your generous expenditure of time and energy on every interest and need of the Society, services which for many years you rendered with no recompense beyond our admiration and gratitude, and which always extended far beyond the limits of your official duties, have laid us and the University women of the future under a lasting debt to

you, which, however earnestly we desire to acknowledge it, we cannot hope to repay.

'That your sagacity and devotion have, so far as human judgment can gauge, secured the Association's future is your great reward, the only one for which, we, who know and respect you, can believe you would really care.' "

Miss Gruner (who was received with acclamation): "Madam President, Friends and Fellow Members of this Association: I am deeply touched by the Address you have presented to me on my retirement from the Secretaryship,—and with the poor words at my command, I can but express to you my sincere gratitude and appreciation of this kind act on your part. Through the Address breathes something of the spirit of the 'Old Guard'—so few of them are now left—who so courageously struggled for the very existence of the Association in its early days. It seems to me to be an inspiration of one of them, and I am deeply grateful for the manner in which you express your appreciation of my Stewardship during the past 20 years. Perhaps you will allow me—and I will not detain you many minutes—to say something of the spirit which animated and helped on the growth of the Association so as to attain its present status in the Educational world.

The few Members who in 1896, over 20 years ago, resolved to carry on the work of the Association when dissolution had been contemplated, were full of hope that this body of teachers might in time grow sufficiently strong to do something for the professional and personal welfare of its Members.

The two things that troubled women teachers at that time, in particular those who had made special efforts to prepare themselves for their vocation by studying at a University, were: first, how to find employment suited to their individual need; and secondly, how to secure just treatment in return for their labour. Practically the latter meant a struggle to ensure adequate salaries. These needs the Association set itself to satisfy.

The Registry—a very modest affair to begin with, met the first need. But the salary question proved difficult and involved much labour. It was a struggle: Meetings and Conferences among ourselves—Meetings with kindred Associations—Conferences with Employers, Public Bodies (the deputation to the London County Council was the last and here we secured the £120 initial salary).

But the struggle proved worth while! For we did succeed in the long run in obtaining for our Members comparatively speaking adequate salaries. However it needed courage, tenacity of purpose and endurance.

Meanwhile temptation came our way. There was the Pfeiffer bequest! I am singling out this particular instance, since it is characteristic of the principles on which the Association was founded.

Among the suggestions made to the trustees on the use to be made of the funds at their disposal was a scheme to form a pension fund for women teachers in Secondary Schools, in view of the impossibility on their part to make provision for old age out of their small salaries! We felt that, if adopted, the scheme would do incalculable harm to the best interests: directly, of women teachers; indirectly, through them, of education. It would be an attempt to compensate by charity for the smallness of salaries. We felt that, if our work was good enough to induce people to entrust us with the education of their children, then we ought to earn enough by our life's work to maintain us through life. It was a case of 'Pay me what is due to me,—and keep thy gift!' We made a hard stand. At the time salaries were actually beginning to rise and we knew that such a pension fund would drive them down again. We knew that some teachers—and their number was increasing—were already able to save because their salaries had risen. It was very bitter for those fighting hard to establish the self-respect and economic independence of women teachers and who were beginning to see some small fruit of their labours, to have their work crossed in this way by impatient benevolence, which proposed to treat the symptoms of a disease we hoped to eradicate!

I am proud to think that this Association was the first to disapprove of the Scheme; other Associations followed our lead and the Trustees did an excellent thing: they endowed Schools and Colleges with Scholarships.

This instance in the past history of the Association also brings to light another point in the policy which guided the Pioneers of the Association, namely, the qualities of foresight and insight: insight into the true needs of the profession at the time, and foresight as to what might be those needs to-morrow or in years to come.

In the Address you have presented to me to-day you so kindly ascribe these qualities to your late Secretary,—but here you do me too great an

honour. After all, I was only the pilot who steered the ship entrusted to my care—and with a definitely clear chart before me—whilst the ship was manned by a fine crew who spread the sails and never spared themselves in carrying the ship safely into port. Such were Mrs. Sidgwick, Miss Clough, Miss Gray of St. Paul's, Miss Geraldine Hodgson, all of Newnham College, Miss L. E. Haigh of Oxford, Miss Welsh, Miss M. S. Kilgour, Miss Vavasseur and Miss K. T. Wallas of Girton College, and Miss Chamney and Miss Husband of London University, and, of course, others. Had it not been for such wise and untiring helpers, there would not have been the growth and progress which have characterised the Association, nor could it have gained the respect and confidence of Public Bodies and Officials as it has done. All action with them was based on principle, never on expediency.

And, last but not least, the success and growth of the Association are also due to the devoted service of able Assistants who from time to time worked under me, more especially Miss Gaymer, who during the most difficult time, when the Association had to struggle for its very existence, gave it unstinted labour, serving the Association four successive years until it became self-supporting.

I am glad to have been able to serve the Association, glad to have lived so long on such friendly terms with the Members. I must thank you for having given me an opportunity of saying these few words and for having listened so patiently to them. I will only add that if any of you care to visit me in a friendly way in my little home it will give me infinite pleasure to see you."

The business part of the Meeting being concluded, the Members adjourned for tea, after which *Mr. Clutton Brock* delivered an inspiring address on "The Spiritual Values of the Humanities," which was very much appreciated.

(2) *Social Meetings in the Lent Term.*

The number of Social Meetings this year was reduced from five to three, partly from motives of economy, and partly because so many Members of the Association were devoting their leisure to war-work that it was felt to be improbable that they would be able to attend meetings, no matter how interesting they might be. The lectures given were remarkable for the wide range of interests to which they appealed. On February 10th, *Dr. Wildon Carr*, the great exponent of Bergson,

gave a most interesting address on the "Philosophy of Change," in which he explained to the uninitiated the nature of some of the problems dealt with by Bergson and showed how the philosopher's view might affect our teaching of history. On March 3rd, *Monsieur Emile Cammaerts*, whose address last year on "Belgian Character in Belgian Literature," had been so highly appreciated that many Members expressed their desire to hear him again, gave an even more delightful lecture on "Emile Verhaeren" with readings so excellently selected as to form a most perfect introduction to Verhaeren's poetry. On March 24th, *Miss Lumsden* gave a most stimulating and practical address on "Patriotism, Education and National Service," a subject of equal interest to parents and teachers. All these addresses were highly appreciated and the Committee very much regret that owing to the shortage of paper they have felt unable to arrange for the printing of any of them.

(3) *Round Table Talk on New Ideals in Education, November 18th.*

An informal meeting for the discussion of New Ideals in Education was held at the Office in November. *Miss Gruner* and Members of the Association, who were also Head Mistresses of Schools or Colleges within a 12-mile radius of Charing Cross, were invited. The President took the Chair at 10.30 a.m. Fifteen Members were present. The subjects proposed for discussion were:—

- (1) What practical measures can be adopted to help children to leave School with a stronger social consciousness?
- (2) What can be done in Schools to discover each pupil's real bent?
- (3) Is it possible to provide responsibilities for each child in School? If so, how can it be done?

The first only was discussed. Various accounts were given of what is being done in different schools to help to bring out social consciousness during the War, and the importance of finding means to keep it up after was emphasised. The League of Social Service in Schools was brought to the notice of Members.

Several Members expressed a hope that such Meetings as this might be repeated.

(4) *National Conference on Educational Reconstruction, May 3rd.*

The Workers' Educational Association, in calling together a National Conference on Educational Reconstruction, framed four resolutions, containing in all some twenty sub-sections. The first and the second Resolutions had for their aim the provision of adequate National (*i.e.*, free) Education for all citizens, beginning with Nursery Schools for children from two to six years of age, continuing through Elementary and Secondary Schools, and finishing with University courses.

The third Resolution demanded an adequate number of well-trained, well-paid, well-pensioned teachers.

The fourth Resolution dealt with the division of financial responsibility between the National Exchequer and the Local Education Authority.

The Conference was well attended. *Miss Alice Woods*, *Miss Chick* and *Mrs. B. Brough* represented the Association of University Women Teachers. After a most interesting discussion all four Resolutions were carried, and a covering Resolution was also passed urging the Government to embody these reforms in the new Education Bill.

(5) *Annual Conference of the Parents' National Educational Union, July 6th.*

The Twenty-first Annual Conference of the Parents' National Educational Union was held at Bedford College on the 6th of July. *Miss Fairbairns* and *Mrs. B. Brough* attended as representatives of the Association of University Women Teachers. The Conference was opened by *Lady Campbell*, introducing *Dr. Sophia Seekings* who gave a most interesting address on "The Physical Training of Young Children," dealing with the needs of children in regard to food, sleep, fresh air, clothing, etc.

Mrs. Allen Harker, author of "Paul and Fiammetta," spoke with great sympathy of "The Child Who Needs Encouragement," drawing special attention to the great loss sustained by children whose fathers

had been killed in the war. The morning session closed with an address from the *Hon. Mrs. Franklin* on a Parents' National Educational Union nursery.

The afternoon session was opened by *Sir Arthur Steele-Maitland*, and the addresses given dealt with the wonderful success which had attended the adoption of the methods of the Parents' Union School in various schools; *Mr. W. Smith* spoke, in illustration of this, of the improvement in speech and manners and the increased love of reading which had developed among the elementary scholars of Wyke Council School, York; *Miss Gardiner* described the working of the method in her school at Buckhurst Hill, and *Mrs. John Buchan* expatiated on the advantages of its adoption in the Home Schoolroom. The Conference was well attended, and all the addresses were thoroughly appreciated.

(6) *Imperial Union of Teachers and League of the Empire, July 20th to 22nd.*

The League of the Empire held its annual meetings this year from Friday, July 20th to Sunday, July 22nd. The General Subject for discussion was: "Some National Spiritual Ideals."

The *Rev. William Temple* spoke on the Anglo-Saxon Ideal, "Justice and Liberty," showing how in Great Britain the supremacy of Law (as alluded to by Plato) had always been tempered by a strong feeling for Justice on the part of the Community, which led even in early times to what he termed "judge-made law," that is law modified by the liberty allowed to the judge to decide according to the circumstances of the case.

Miss Burrows, Principal of St. Hilda's Hall, Oxford, mentioned four features of the Anglo-Saxon Ideal: (1) Local Government, (2) Peripatetic justice, (3) The Social Ladder, or better, the Highway of Fellowship, (4) The Place of Religion in the Centre of All.

Professor A. V. Salmon of the "Alliance Française," gave a most interesting sketch of the way in which French national energies had enabled his country again and again to rise above what seemed to be crushing loss. He instanced the payment in a year and a half of the war indemnity of £200,000,000 demanded by the Germans in 1870, the wonderful recovery of the vine industry from the losses caused by the phylloxera disease, and paid an eloquent tribute to the women who had

taken up men's work and carried on most arduous industries during the war.

The Headmaster of Sydney Grammar School gave an account of his experience while billeted in a little village near Amiens, and spoke of the pre-eminence of France in modern poetry.

On Saturday evening a reception was held at the Caxton Hall for Members of the Union and visitors from the Over-seas Dominions and Allied Countries. *Monsieur V. Mouravieff-Apostol* spoke of the "Power of Service: a Fundamental Characteristic of the Russian Nature expressed in Literature and worked out in Actuality."

On Sunday, *A. Yusuf Ali, Esqre.* took as his theme "Domestic Love as the Foundation of Family and National Life, as shown in Indian Literature and Indian Life."

(7) *Report of the Meeting of the Uplands Association, July 31st to August 16th.*

The Third Summer Meeting of the Uplands Association founded by *Dr. Findlay* was held at Bangor from July 31st to August 16th. Its distinguishing features were:—

(a) That parents were specially invited to attend the Meeting, and to bring their children, for whom a special set of classes was held, and delightful opportunities for out-door camp play arranged.

(b) That everyone who attended was expected to join some class, either the Seminars conducted by *Professor Findlay (Manchester)* and *Mr. Jackson (Sunderland)* or a Gardening or Eurythmics or Handicrafts class conducted respectively by *Miss C. Pugh*, *Miss E. Findlay* and *Miss W. Harrison*, nearly every afternoon.

(c) That there was a delightful atmosphere of good-will and friendliness due partly to the tact and enthusiasm of the leaders, and partly to the comparative smallness of the gathering which enabled all the fifty to sixty members present to become acquainted with one another.

Discussions were opened by *Dr. Sheppard* on the "Adaptation of General Education to Different Types of Children, with special Reference to the Visualiser"; by *Miss Alice Woods* on "The Training of the Child for Social Service"; and by *Miss Morton* on "The Child's Religious Education." Three excellent lectures were given by *Professor*

Findlay on "Reconstruction" and "Corporate Life," and three by *Mr. Lamborn*, Headmaster of East Oxford School, on "The General Curriculum of the School."

(8) *Conference of New Ideals in Education, August 14th to 21st.*

This year's Conference of New Ideals in Education was held at Bedford College from August 14th to 21st. Over 200 people were present.

The plan of the Conference was to devote the first three days to one subject, viz.: "The Education of the Adolescent"; to give one day to accounts of Educational experiments, and one day to some burning topic of the present time. For this, the subject "Nursery Schools" was selected.

The papers and speeches reached a high standard; mention may be made of a few of them. *Mr. Fisher*, the President of the Board of Education, gave an opening address on "The Education of the Future," *Professor Bompas Smith* spoke on the "Problems of the Urban Continuation School," and *Mr. R. G. Hatton* on those of similar schools in country districts. *Mr. Albert Mansbridge* gave a most illuminating address on "Education, Craftsmanship and Leisure." *Miss Margaret McMillan* opened an animated discussion on an Ideal Nursery School. *Mr. Homer Lane* read a paper on "The Little Commonwealth and the Religious Problem," which called forth the deepest interest.

On the Experiments Day *Miss Enright's* paper on the "Possibilities of Literature in an Elementary School," was read by *Mr. Edmond Holmes*, one of the most interesting illustrations being a new chapter in "Alice in Wonderland," written by a girl of 13. *Mr. Mitchell* described some of his experiments in Geometry Teaching. *Miss Dewdney* showed how self-instruction could be adopted in lessons in elementary Arithmetic.

The striking characteristic of the Conference was the stress laid in almost every paper and by every speaker on the importance of giving the child and the master opportunities for creative work. All looked forward to a future in education which would mean "an increasing

substitution of man in the rôle of creator for man as creature of circumstance and habit."

(9) *Council Meeting of the National Union of Women Workers, December 7th and 8th, 1916.*

The Annual Council Meeting of the National Union of Women Workers was held on December 7th and 8th at the Y.M.C.A. Hall, Tottenham Court Road, *Mrs. Creighton*, President, in the Chair. *Miss Foley* and *Miss Strudwick* represented the A.U.W.T. Before the proceedings began, *Lady Frances Balfour* moved a resolution of deep sympathy for those women workers who had lost relatives in the war; this was carried in silence, all standing.

The Secretary, *Miss N. E. Green*, then presented the Twenty-first Annual Report, which showed another year of active work.

Through the Consultative Committee, under the Chairmanship of *Mrs. Creighton*, the Union had been able to deal with various questions such as the housing, feeding and recreation of munition and other workers, the need for week-end munition workers, cheap meals for working girls, help for the professional classes during the war, work of women on the land, the National War Savings Campaign, the control of the Liquor Traffic, etc.

An urgency resolution, proposed by *Dr. Helen Wilson*, and seconded by *Mrs. James Gow*, welcoming the steps now being taken to provide free and accessible medical treatment for all persons suffering from venereal diseases, but declaring that any attempt to enforce compulsory notification would be a serious mistake, was carried unanimously. A further resolution was passed urging that the age of consent should be fixed at 18 for girls and youths.

A resolution urging that women should be included in the Parliamentary Electorate of the United Kingdom and thus be enabled to render greater service to the State was carried by a large majority, and another in favour of the nationalisation of the Liquor Traffic moved by *Lady Henry Somerset* met with the same success.

The Conference on Women Patrols, held on Friday, December 8th,

was an illuminating one, speakers from different parts of the United Kingdom giving their experiences and recounting their impressions. All were emphatic in their assertion of the need for a counter-attraction in the shape of clubs to which girl-workers might bring sweethearts and friends. The clubs which had been established had been without exception thoroughly successful. Women Patrols had fully justified their existence, and had made the path smoother for the hoped-for appointment of women police.

During the two days' meeting, interesting conferences took place on "Drink Traffic Reform" and "Work and Recreation as promoted by Clubs," and a Public Meeting was also held, the speakers being *Mrs. Creighton*, *Mrs. Sidney Webb*, and *The Rev. A. Carlyle, M.A., D.Litt.*

The "Handbook and Report of the National Council and Union of Women Workers of Great Britain and Ireland" can be seen at the office of the Association of University Women Teachers if desired.

(10) *Council Meeting of the National Union of Women Workers, October 3rd to 5th, 1917.*

The Annual Council Meeting of the National Union of Women Workers was held at the Y.M.C.A. Hall, Tottenham Court Road, on October the 3rd, 4th and 5th, *Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon*, President, in the Chair.

Proceedings opened with an address from the President, enumerating some of the many activities of women workers during the past year. *The Hon. Treasurer* presented the statement of accounts, which unfortunately showed a deficit; she appealed for more subscribers and larger subscriptions. With the permission of the Council, the following urgency resolution was proposed by *Mrs. Oliver Strachey*, seconded by *Lady Selborne* and carried almost unanimously, only three members voting against it:—

"That in view of the probable extension of the Union's work as a result of the enfranchisement of women, a Committee be formed to consider the constitution of the National Union of Women Workers, and to report to the next meeting of the Council. This Committee shall consist of the Hon. Officers of the Society, and six members nominated and elected by the Branches and six members nominated and elected by the Affiliated Societies and six members of the Executive Committee of the National Union of Women Workers, the election to be by postal vote."

A further motion that "The Affiliated Societies" shall elect twelve

members who shall represent them on the Executive Committee, such representatives to serve for one year, was carried, but a rider proposing that "nominations shall be made during Council, and voting shall take place before the end of the Council," was withdrawn, as it was felt that more time was needed to insure proper representation of the Affiliated Societies.

Much time was occupied in minor resolutions affecting the constitution of the Union.

Among the resolutions passed were one for the further protection of infant life by the extension of the "Notification of Births Act"; and two urgency resolutions, one protesting against any difference of pay in secondary and elementary schools on account of sex; the other urging the Secretary of State to add women to the Commission to enquire into the educational policy of the University of Calcutta.

Professor Kirkcaldy of Birmingham in addressing a meeting on the "Industrial position of Women as an outcome of the War," pointed out very clearly the difference between "Dilution" and "Replacement." He showed that women have been able to work the new and improved machinery, which the need of the time has brought into use, most successfully: that the out-put of un-skilled or semi-skilled women, has often been greater than the pre-war out-put of highly skilled men, but that as yet it has been proved only in a few cases, and by no means by women in general, that they are capable of replacing men whose work is skilled and responsible, and for whose work no help from more highly developed machinery can yet be obtained. He declared that women had successfully taken the place of men in "repetition" work, but have yet to show they are willing to undergo training to fit them for positions demanding a high rate of skill, great responsibility, and fixity of tenure.

THE REGISTRY.

Although the number of posts filled is less than was the case last year, the Committee consider the report of the work of the Registry to be quite satisfactory. The number of applications for teachers has greatly increased and the difficulty of finding suitable Mistresses is now great, as there is a very serious shortage of teachers in almost every subject. Members are earnestly requested to inform the Secretary when they desire work. The demand for women teachers in boys' schools still continues and those supplied by the Association have proved most efficient. Salaries have very decidedly increased as is shown by the table of appointments, the figures quoted are in each case irrespective of a war-bonus.

Only two posts abroad, both in South Africa, have been filled this year; very few applications from abroad for Mistresses have been received; later in the year even when Mistresses obtained an appointment they were not always able to take it up, owing to the impossibility of obtaining a passport.

(I) PUBLIC SCHOOLS.
