Dear Miss Hunter,

The sort of trumped up matter, affecting a few people, which are considered "more urgent" is really enough to madden women. We don't want to threaten or bluster, or be violent but we do want to drive it home that we have waited long enough & that now the question is ripe & the patience has been shown & the long steady work been done, there is no excuse for further delay, & that,

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as the men have the votes, the responsibility for the injustices
cannot be suitably shuffled off onto us, who have them not.
