

## CONSTITUTION.

### TITLE.

## THE EDINBURGH NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE.

### OBJECT.

To obtain the Parliamentary Franchise for women on the same terms as it is, or may be, granted to men.

## METHODS.

The adoption of all legal and constitutional means to advance the Object :---

- (a) By acting as a centre for collection and diffusion of information with regard to the progress of the movement in all parts of the country.
- (b) By holding Public Meetings.
- (c) By the distribution of Pamphlets, Leaflets, and other literature bearing on the subject.
- (d) By the formation of Women's Suffrage Societies.
- (e) By working at Elections and By-Elections according to the policy of the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies.
- (f) By getting up petitions in favour of the Reform.

## MEMBERS.

Men and women in favour of the "Object" shall be eligible as members.

## SUBSCRIPTION.

The Minimum Annual Subscription shall be One Shilling.

## THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

- (a) The Executive Committee shall consist of not more than twenty-one members, that is to say, of the President, two Vice-Presidents, the Secretary and the Treasurer, and sixteen ordinary members.
- (b) The Office-bearers and the ordinary members of the Executive Committee shall be elected by the members of the Society at the Annual Business Meeting.
- (c) The Members of the Executive Committee shall retire annually but shall be eligible for re-election : vacancies during the year to be filled by co-option.
- (d) The notice calling the Annual Business Meeting shall be sent to members fourteen days before the Meeting, and shall include an intimation that nominations for members of the Executive Committee shall be sent to the office seven days before the Meeting.

## FORTY-SEVENTH REPORT

OF THE

## Edinburgh Mational Society for Women's Suffrage.

THE Executive Committee of the Edinburgh National Society for Women's Suffrage have the honour to present their Report for the year 1914.

Never before in the history of the Society has it lived through a year at all comparable to the one which has just come to an end. The Boer War, sad and dreadful and costly though it was, fades into a mere skirmish when compared with the titanic conflict in which our country is now engaged.

The manhood of the nation has not only proved itself worthy of the great traditions of the past, but has even created as great a tradition of loyalty, fortitude, courage, and kindliness to hand down to the future. And the women have shown themselves no less worthy than the men. As Lord Selborne has well said: "The men have given their lives; but the women have given what is dearer than life itself-the lives of those they loved." To us, as suffragists, it is interesting to notice that the arguments advanced by Germany to prove the righteousness of her cause-arguments which, briefly put, amount to Might is Righthave been met by every civilised nation with the direct negative. We have always combated the false doctrine that brute force rules the world, and when the clash of arms is past, we trust that those who were not unmindful of the rights of the weaker nations will show themselves equally willing to render justice to the rights of the physically weaker sex.

The year falls naturally into two parts: Before the war, and during the war. From 1st January to 4th August we were busy with ordinary suffrage work. Since 4th August we have been even busier with all kinds of relief work, and more especially with that connected with the Soldiers' and Sailors' Families Association.

Leith Burghs By-Election.—The chief event in the early part of the year was the By-Election in Leith Burghs, caused by the appointment of Sir R. Munro-Ferguson to the Governor-Generalship of the Australian Commonwealth.

There were three candidates :----

Provost Smith, Liberal.

Mr George Currie, Conservative.

Mr John Bell, Labour.

Leith Burghs being an E.F.F. constituency, the National Union put its policy in force and supported the Labour candidate. The

(e) Election shall be by ballot.

- (f) No one shall be eligible as a member of the Executive Committee who is a member of (a) any Political Party Organisation or (b) any Militant Suffrage Society.
- (g) The Executive Committee shall meet at least once a month. Five members shall form a quorum.
- (h) The Executive Committee shall have the right to appoint Sub-Committees of not less than three members, one of whom must be a member of the Executive Committee; the others may be ordinary members of the Society.
- (i) No member of Executive shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year who has not attended at least 50 per cent. of the ordinary meetings of the Committee.

## THE PRESIDENT.

The President shall convene all meetings, which shall be called by the Secretary.

The Chairman shall have a deliberative and a casting vote.

### FINANCE.

The Financial year shall close on the 31st of December.

The Treasurer shall submit a Balance-Sheet at the Annual Meeting.

The Accounts shall be audited annually by an auditor appointed by the Society.

## MEETINGS OF THE SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting shall be held in February after the Annual Council Meeting of the N.U.W.S.S.

Not less than two business meetings shall be held during the year, whereof one shall be the Annual Meeting of the Society as above mentioned, and the other, a meeting held after the second Council Meeting of the N.U.W.S.S.

No alteration of the Constitution may be made except at the Annual Meeting.

Other business meetings shall be arranged by the Executive Committee.

Extraordinary business meetings shall be called on the written requisition of one-third of the Executive Committee, or of 25 ordinary members of the Society.

Seven days' notice shall be given of all extraordinary business Meetings, and the business to be transacted shall be intimated on the cards summoning the Meeting.

Sixty Members shall form a quorum.

## ALTERATION OF CONSTITUTION.

The Constitution of the Society can be altered at the Annua. Business Meeting or at any General Business Meeting, if, after the statutory notice has been given, two-thirds of the members, present and voting, vote for the alteration.

election was run by headquarters, with Miss L. M. Gordon, of this Society, in command. Though we failed in our primary objectthat of returning a Labour member because his party was pledged to Women's Suffrage-we succeeded in our secondary aim, namely, that of preventing the return of the Government nominee. Mr George Currie, who is himself a suffragist, was returned by a majority of 16 votes, and Leith Burghs was lost to an anti-suffragist Government.

Meetings.—We had no large meeting this year, but the number of small ones was legion. The Leith Burghs By-Election accounted for a good many; and during the summer the Active Service League, under the able leadership of Miss Daisy M'Kay, organised numerous open-air meetings both in Edinburgh and in the country districts of Midlothian.

Meetings were held at Armadale, Bonnyrigg, Addiewell, Balerno, Bonnington, Corstorphine, Dalkeith, Broxburn, Davidson's Mains, Portobello, Summerhall, Hunterfield, East Calder, West Calder, Rosewell, Musselburgh, Uphall, Roslin.

There were several open-air meetings in Edinburgh itself; notably two in the Grassmarket, addressed by Mrs Shaw M'Laren and others, which had the distinction of being the first suffrage meetings held in that locality which were not broken up by hooligans.

Following the precedent of former years, we had visits from special speakers from the National Union. Miss Margaret Robertson came to us on 6th February and addressed meetings at Pumpherston, East Calder, and at 40 Shandwick Place.

She came to us again on 22nd May for a week and spoke at the Office, and at Bonnyrigg, Leith, Penicuik, and Newtongrange.

Miss Matters visited us on 8th June and stayed till the 20th, working hard all the time.

She addressed meetings at Linlithgow, Bathgate, Portobello, Musselburgh, Leith, and Loanhead. She also addressed a Members' Meeting, gave a lecture on "Ibsen," and spoke at a Drawingroom Meeting kindly given by Mrs Inglis Clark.

Mrs Aldersley came for some time in June and addressed meetings at Gorebridge, Fauldhouse, Newtongrange, Westercraig, Blackridge, and Newcraighall.

She returned in the beginning of July and addressed meetings in Saughton Park, Gilmerton, Blackburn, Penicuik, Rosewell, Balerno, Bonnington, besides several meetings in Leith.

In addition to this work in her own area, Miss Low addressed meetings in Alloa and Innerleithen. She also spent ten days in Newcastle in the service of the North-Eastern Federation in repayment of the debt incurred by the Edinburgh Society, who had previously had the services, for a similar period, of Miss C. M. Gordon.

Miss Pressley-Smith has also addressed numerous meetings in the neighbourhood.

The Society has held no fewer than three General Meetings of Members during the past year, viz. :- On 24th January, 27th February, and 10th June.

The Annual Meeting was held on 27th February in the Goold Hall. It was a purely business meeting, and there was no special

speaker. The Society decided at this meeting that it would like to have another General Meeting in the summer, and accordingly a meeting was held on 10th June, when the Society heard of the work done in the earlier part of the year, and also had the pleasure of listening to an address by Miss Matters.

Miss Evelyn Simson and others had a Cake and Candy Stall at the meeting in June, and were able as a result of their efforts to hand over the sum of  $\pounds 6$ . 10s. to the Hon. Treasurer at the close of the meeting.

**Deputations.**—1914 might well be called the year of deputations. The Scottish Federation suggested that it would greatly help the cause of Women's Suffrage if organised bodies of voters sent Resolutions to their Members of Parliament urging the reform, and pressing for a Government measure. The National Union approved of the suggestion, and coupled with it the idea of a great Demonstration of Organised Bodies of Voters in the Albert Hall. This meant an immense amount of work for the Societies. The Edinburgh National Society sent letters to each of the organised bodies of men in its area, asking them to receive a deputation, to pass a Resolution in favour of Women's Suffrage, and to send a delegate to the Demonstration in the Albert Hall. Some Societies failed to answer the letter, but a large number received a deputation and passed the Franchise Resolution, and several sent delegates to the Albert Hall, and were even kind enough to lend their banners for the occasion.

A deputation was received, and a Franchise Resolution was passed by the Edinburgh Town Council.

On 2nd December Councillor Crawford moved the following Resolution :--- "That the Council petition Parliament in favour of extending the Franchise to women on the same terms as men."

This was seconded by Mr Bruce Lindsay, and was carried by 29 to 14 votes, after the words "on the same terms as men" had been deleted.

On 13th January 1914 a proposal to send a deputation to London to interview the Prime Minister was defeated by I vote, the voting being 22 to 21.

On 10th February a deputation waited upon the Leith Town Council, which passed a Resolution in favour of Women's Suffrage by a majority of I vote.

The Rev. Mr Robertson, the Rev. Mr Wilson, and Mrs Joseph Dobbie formed the deputation, which was introduced by Councillor Clarice M'Nab.

## Societies which took Action.

The City of Edinburgh Labour Party.-Appointed two delegates to attend the Demonstration in the Albert Hall and paid their expenses. The delegates, who both attended the meeting, were Councillor Crawford and Mr Robert Allen.

Western I.L.P. and Bo'ness I.L.P.-Sent Mr George Dall to represent them at the Albert Hall.

National Amalgamated Society of French Polishers.—Sent Mr Robertson as delegate to the meeting.

Amalgamated Society of Lithographic Printers.-Passed Resolution unanimously, and wrote to headquarters urging them to send

a delegate to London. Amalgamated Society of Railway Clerks. - Passed Resolution.

Postal and Telegraph Clerks' Association. - Proxy delegates appointed. Amalgamated Society of Engineers and Locomotive Workers.-Resolution passed and proxy delegate asked for.

Operative Bakers and Confectioners.—Resolution passed unanimously. West End Engineers.-Appointed a proxy delegate. Amalgamated Society of Woodcutters and Machinists.-Resolution was passed and sent to the Members of Parliament in the

district.

Carpenters and Joiners.—Resolution was passed. National Union of Warehousemen and Clerks.-Resolution was passed.

Postmen's Federation.—Asked their headquarters to send a proxy delegate to the meeting in the Albert Hall. Young Scots Society.—Sent a delegate to the meeting.

Association of Ironworkers and Blacksmiths (Leith).- The Resolution was passed unanimously. The following Resolution was

also passed by 14 votes to 6:-""That we pledge ourselves not to support or vote for any man who is against Women's Suffrage.'

Amalgamated Society of Engineers. Branch 2, Leith.-Resolution passed unanimously.

Leith Railway Servants.- A unanimous Resolution was passed in favour of Women's Suffrage, and the Society promised to arrange for a delegate to go to London.

British Socialist Party .- Said that they were committed to Adult Suffrage and could take no part in our Demonstration.

Edinburgh and District Trades Council.-Secretary wrote to the

E.N.S.W.S. that the Council is committed to Adult Suffrage.

Entertainments .- On 20th March a fine performance of the "Antigone," organised by Miss Lucy Bruce and Miss Isabella

Pagan, in aid of the funds of the Society, was given in the Lauriston Hall. Miss Bruce played the part of Antigone, and gave an effective representation of the brave but hapless heroine. Before the play Miss Pagan delivered a short lecture on Greek Drama, pointing out that Antigone in her fearless opposition to an unjust law, was inspired by the spirit which animates all true suffragists.

The sum of  $\pounds_{10}$  was gained for the Society.

Reception.—On 27th March the Edinburgh Society held a reception in 40 Shandwick Place in honour of the delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Scottish Federation. The feature of the evening was a stirring speech by Mrs Swanwick.

On 9th October a delightful entertainment was organised at 40 Shandwick Place by Miss Florence Raeburn. A reading of her play, "In Time of War," was given by the authoress, assisted by Mrs Pyatt, Miss Lilian Brotchie, and Miss Oswald. Miss May Lawson gave some beautiful violin solos.

A considerable sum was added to the funds of the Society.

Sales.—On Saturday, 4th July, the Edinburgh Society held a "Flower Day" in the city. Members of the Society, wearing the colours and carrying placards, emphasising the fact that it is "Nonmilitant," sold flowers in all the streets of the town. The thanks of the Society are specially due to Mr Inglis who provided all the travs for the flower-sellers, and to Mrs Wilson who prepared dainty and refreshing meals for the sellers when they returned from their beats.

The day was very successful. The funds benefited by the sum of over  $\pounds_{20}$ , and the Society had a peaceful and picturesque advertisement-not the less valuable that the sellers came in for a little abuse from both anti-suffragists and militants.

Jumble Sale.—The Annual Jumble Sale, which realised  $f_{21}$ , took place in the Buccleuch Street Hall on 9th May, the arrangements being made by Miss Balfour and Miss Katherine Kemp. The hearty thanks of the Society are due to all who worked so indefatigably both before and during the Sale.

Christmas Sale.—Owing to the war, the great Annual Sale was not held; but the Sale Committee, under its energetic Convener, Mrs Purves, organised a smaller Christmas Sale in the Society's Rooms on 4th December. It was opened by Miss Eva Moore (who was playing in Edinburgh at the time), in an amusing and witty speech, and proved more successful than its promoters had dared to hope, over  $\pounds_{75}$  being taken in receipts and donations.

The Sale Committee owes special thanks to Madame Marie Stewart, palmist and clairvoyant, who again gave her services free for the whole day-a very generous donation to the funds.

Press Work.—During the first half of the year 1914 the work of the Press Committee was carried on much as usual, until the war put its arresting hand on this department of work, as it did on others.

The Committee's services, however, and its present objective is to obtain public recognition of the devoted services that are being rendered to the State by the Edinburgh National Society for Women's Suffrage. This it has done by furnishing various newspapers with an account of the activities of the Society in the various departments of national work on which it has been engaged.

At the end of the year the Edinburgh Evening News published a long and interesting account of activities entered upon and being carried out by the Society, and the Glasgow Herald gave a shorter account of the same.

The Scotsman on 2nd January this year gave a column recording the work of the N.U.W.S.S. for the year 1914, including in this a paragraph relating to the work of the Edinburgh Society. The Dispatch followed with half a column.

The Evening News again favoured us with a column. The Weekly Scotsman, from whose pages has quite disappeared "The Woman's Outlook," yet published quite half a column.

Special thanks are due to Mrs Eddington, the Convener of the Press Committee, who has had charge of this important branch of the Society's work during the whole year; and also to Miss Alice Kemp and Mrs Cargill Knott who have given their chief most efficient help.

## Friends of Women's Suffrage Report,

from the beginning of January to the end of July 1914.

At the end of 1913 the "Friends" numbered 1,517, an increase on the preceding year of 1,144. The present report is only for half a year-from January to the end of July 1914. In the beginning of August came the outbreak of war, suffrage propaganda practically ceased, and all activity was directed into channels of relief.

The chief event of the first quarter was Leith Burghs By-Election, and by it we gained 221 "Friends." The increase for the quarter was 3.32.

In the middle of next quarter-on Tuesday, 2nd May-a meeting was held in the Free Gardeners' Hall, Picardy Place, to which all "Friends" in Edinburgh and Leith were invited. Miss Low was in the chair. The speakers were Mrs Shaw M'Laren and Mr M'Michael, and there were two singers, Mrs Alfred Young and Mr James Low. The programme was interesting and varied. The earnest appeal of Mrs Shaw M'Laren, the few but convincing words of Mr M'Michael, the mingling of the grave and the gay in the songs, was much appreciated by a fairly large and very sympathetic audience.

The increase for this quarter was 384, and for the half-year 706. At the end of July the total number of "Friends" was 2,223, and we had 84 visitors.

This very satisfactory state of affairs is due chiefly to the

unwearying efforts of Miss Rachel Jeffrey, our F.W.S. Secretary, who grudges neither time nor labour to the work.

Common Cause Report.-In last year's Report the hope was expressed that we might achieve great things for Common Cause during 1914. Circumstances seem to have been against us, but we have done our utmost to sustain the sale of the paper throughout the year, and especially since the beginning of August. The Common Cause Report might be divided into two portions-one dealing with the first seven months of the year, and the other with the last five months. From January to July the number of copies disposed of was 5,370. This shows an increase of 998, as the number disposed of during the same period of the preceding year was 4,372 copies. This means an increase of 32 copies per week. During the last five months of the year, however, we have only disposed of 2,143 copies of Common Cause, an average of 102 per week. As the average per week during the first seven months of the year was 173 copies, this means a decrease of 71 per week. The total number disposed of during the year was 7,513 copies, a decrease of 2,028. This has been unavoidable, as there have been no meetings except the Friday meetings in the Office.

The Common Cause Sub-Committee has met six times during, 1914.

Members of the Active Service League helped to increase the sales of the paper at the meetings held under the auspices of the above League.

During the Leith Election Campaign, early in February, 504 copies of the *Common Cause* were sold.

Miss R. Jeffrey and Miss D. MacKay have been most ardent street sellers during the earlier part of the year. At present we do not find a ready sale for our paper in the streets or at the doors of meetings. We would therefore ask each member of the Society who is not now a subscriber to become one. By so doing we will avoid having a further decrease in the sales next year, and also help the National Union in these difficult days.

Free copies (46) are still sent each week to libraries, editors, I.L.P. Secretaries, and Members of Parliament in our own area, whilst a few are sent to the various Territorial battalions scattered throughout the city.

The thanks of the Society are due to Miss Elizabeth Moody, Convener of the *Common Cause* Committee, for her energy in furthering the sale of the paper; and to the Misses Thomson, Neill, and Scott for addressing the papers each week, and thereby rendering valuable assistance.

Active Service League.—The E.N.S.W.S. took up the scheme of the Active Service League as soon as it was set on foot by the National Union, and an Edinburgh Branch of the League was formed in April 1914, consisting ultimately of fortyeight members, under a group leader and a small committee. The Edinburgh Society's organisation for the visiting of "Friends" was already very large, and so has been kept separate from the A.S.L.

Leaguers have done good service in selling the Common Cause in the street and outside public meetings, but the principal work during the summer months—May, June, and July—was the organisation of open-air meetings in Edinburgh and the surrounding villages. During these months the A.S.L. worked up and held twenty-six of these meetings, at which 484 Common Causes were sold and 247 "Friends" enrolled. At all these meetings one at least of the speakers was a leaguer. Thirteen members of our League have spoken for us, several of whom were novices in the art. In connection with this a class was held in May by Miss Alice Low to train new speakers.

Since the war broke out the Edinburgh Active Service League has taken up no special branch of work, all the energies of its members being required in the relief work undertaken by our Society, especially in connection with the S.S.F.A. Of our few men leaguers, one has joined the colours, and another, Mr George Nicolson, L.D.S., has for many months given his professional services free to the soldiers and sailors stationed in the Edinburgh district.

**Debating Society.**—At a meeting held at this office on 9th February 1914, it was decided to start a Debating Society which should meet on second and fourth Mondays between the months of October and May. Seven meetings were held in 1914, and the membership rose to forty-eight.

It was decided to hold meetings from October 1914 to March 1915, and a syllabus was drawn up, but, owing to the war, it was thought desirable to postpone these meetings, and the Committee offered to assist the Edinburgh Society in investigating cases for the S.S.F.A.

The Debating Society arranged to take a stall at the Annual Sale, and arrangements to that effect were made, but owing to the war this Sale did not take place. However, a Competition which had been started in connection with the stall proceeded, and resulted in a profit of  $\pounds_3$ . 6s. 6d.

Report of Work done since the War began.— Following the lead of the National Union in London, the Edinburgh Society, on the outbreak of war, suspended its political activities, and devoted itself immediately to the relief of distress. Miss Pressley-Smith at once returned to Edinburgh to organise the relief work of the Society, Miss Low and Miss Gordon being detained in Germany. Members were circularised to find out what particular work they were willing to do, and the services of the Society were offered to the various relief agencies in the town. Efforts were made to secure representation for the Society on the local Relief Committee, and though, in spite of several letters and a deputation to the Lord Provost, this was not secured, Miss Pressley-Smith became a member of a Supplementary Women's Committee, and she was also successful in obtaining representation for the Society on most of the Ward Committees.

Classes in Invalid and Emergency Cooking were started by Miss Jean Pagan and Miss Wilkinson. Miss Pagan returned all expenses and pupils' fees as a donation.

A class in First-Aid, Ambulance, and Sick Nursing was also held in a house lent by another member, Miss Knox. The lectures were given by Dr Turpie and Dr M'Farlane Barker, and Nurse Dick, a member of the Society, gave valuable help.

A register of all offers of help was kept. This was started in the Office and continued in a shop, which was open for two months as a registration bureau for voluntary workers.

Good Press notices were obtained in all the leading papers of the work that was being done by the Society.

In September our help was asked in the organisation of the Dependants' Section of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Families Association in Edinburgh, and a large proportion of the conveners of wards and visitors were supplied from our members.

Following upon that, the Society was asked to take over the visitation of the wives and dependants of the soldiers and sailors in Leith, and Miss Gordon and Miss Pressley-Smith were appointed to the Garrison Sub-Committee for Leith of the S.S.F.A. This work is still going on, there being under the care of the Society 700 families, which are organised under about seventy visitors.

The administration of the Royal Patriotic Fund grants is also in the hands of the Society.

Miss Gordon, Miss Pressley-Smith, and their visitors have helped with the organisation of a club for soldiers' and sailors' wives and dependants in Leith.

Miss Pressley-Smith represents the E.N.S.W.S. on the General Relief Committee in Leith, and was also appointed to the Executive as the representative of five women's organisations. She is also a member of the Sub-Committee on Women's Employment, Leith, and has helped in the arrangement of the workroom, and has also taken part in investigating cases of applicants for relief.

Sub-Committee on Women's Employment, Edinburgh. -About the middle of October 1914, when the above Committee was first formed, Miss Low became a member, and was very shortly appointed to be Hon. Secretary of an Industries Sub-Committee.

Before long, she found that the work of the Industries Sub-Committee was overlapping with that of the Labour Exchange, and suggested that it should be dissolved. This was accordingly done, and Miss Low was asked to become Joint-Secretary with Mrs Alexander Maitland of the Sub-Committee on Women's Employment itself.

The premises in the City Chambers, consisting of a robing room, were found to be too small for the work, and the office was moved to 29 Frederick Street, where premises were lent by the W.S.P.U. Towards the end of November, Mrs Maitland was forced to resign the Secretaryship on account of health, and Miss Low became the sole Hon. Secretary of the Committee, by permission of our Society.

During the months of November, December, and January four workrooms were opened in different parts of the town, and over 200 women are accommodated at the moment of writing. Most of them are whole-time workers-who are sewing, knitting, and adapting old garments at 18 Melville Street; sewing, knitting, and receiving instruction in cookery, personal hygiene, and home sicknursing at Hope Park Halls; receiving a training in the domestic arts at I Randolph Crescent; and working part time at St Stephen's Halls. In addition to this, sewing and knitting is distributed to a few home workers from the City Chambers.

All applicants recommended for the workrooms by the Ward Committees and the Local Committee have to pass through Miss Low's office, and in addition many women who are in difficulty and distress, which is not directly traceable to the war, come there for help and advice.

Every attempt must be made to replace the workers in ordinary employment, and a messenger is kept daily busy, taking messages to the different workrooms (none of which are on the telephone) about situations for which workers are immediately required.

The Ward Committees may apply for garments made up in the workrooms, and these applications have all to be considered, the garments selected, and their transport arranged for.

Committee Meetings have to be summoned and a mass of correspondence dealt with, between the Sub-Committee on Women's Employment and the Town Clerk's Office, and the Scottish Committee on Women's Employment.

Much good work has been done, and although the Sub-Many of the Committee have had their eyes opened to the

Committee has been prevented in its efforts to train workers for new trades by the hard and fast rules governing the application of grants from the Queen's Work for Women Fund, still, the acute distress has been relieved, and the Committee is in a position to deal with unemployment among Edinburgh women caused by the war. low rate of wages, and the consequent low standard of health, which prevails among the women workers of Edinburgh.

War Work Party (August 1914).—In less than a week after the outbreak of war a Work Party was formed which met daily at 40 Shandwick Place. It was found that those members who were still in town were anxious to start relief work of some kind. In this way useful work was done, and keen workers kept together while more elaborate schemes were thought

out. A fund was started and  $\pounds_{27}$  contributed by those who were interested. Material was bought and garments began rapidly to take shape in the hands of willing and enthusiastic workers. This continued for a fortnight. The Lord Provost was then organising his scheme for the supply of soldiers' comforts, and advantage was taken of his offer of a room at the Synod Hall where we might work under the Town. There we remained until the end of the first week of September. At that date the Town Work Parties were discontinued owing to the denial of the War Office of the need of the soldiers and sailors for socks and shirts. Since then the garments that had been given out at the Synod Hall have been returned to Shandwick Place, and we have received many donations as well. These were re-distributed to the Central Bureau of the City for Soldiers' Comforts, or to any hospital, regiment, or Society that might be in special need at the time. In this way we have given out about 800 garments (amongst them over 300 pairs of socks), and in addition many parcels of old clothes to the Belgian refugees, the convalescent soldiers, the poor of Leith, and parcels of old linen to the Red Cross Society.

This work still continues, and contributions will be gladly received.

Special mention must be made of the Work Party organised by Mrs Gunn, a member of the Society, which has been working indefatigably since the beginning of the war, and which has made and distributed a vast number of garments and of soldiers' comforts of every description.

Scottish Women's Hospital for Foreign Service.-Many members of the Edinburgh National Society have given donations to the above Hospital, have collected money for it, as witness the "Morningside" and "Newington" Beds, and have worked in the Scottish Federation Office in preparing and packing the equipment of the Units.

The Society has in addition given  $\pounds 50$ , thus endowing and naming a bed for one year.\*

Our Hon. Auditor.—The warmest thanks of the Society are due to our Hon. Auditor, Mr Dall, whose services are a most valued and valuable gift to the Society.

Our Organisers.—The Committee wish to record their high appreciation of the services of their own organisers, Miss Alice Low and Miss Lisa Gordon, and of the organiser lent to the Society by the National Union, Miss Pressley-Smith.

Miss Gordon and Miss Pressley-Smith have the entire charge and oversight of the work of the S.S.F.A. in Leith among the wives and dependants of the regulars and the new army. They attend

countless meetings, they work hours overtime, and their work is always splendidly done.

Miss Low has been lent, as already reported, to the Committee on Women's Employment, which is a Sub-Committee of the Local Committee, and her work-often delicate and difficult, always hard -has won the warmest praise from all who have come in contact with her.

The Committee also desire to express their appreciation of the services of Miss Maud Abbott, the Office Secretary, who, by her devoted labours during office hours, and her constant and ungrudging sacrifice of much of her leisure, gives a great deal more to the Society than appears in any Report.

Help given in the Office.—Special mention must be made of the ladies who, since the war began, have given unremitting assistance in the office :-- Miss Lindsay Jardine, Miss Mary Christie, Miss Gilruth, Miss Crawford, Miss Ritchie, the Misses Bruce, and Lady Lorimer. Much valuable help has also been given by Mrs Norman, Miss Tedcastle, Miss Fraser, Mrs and Miss MacKay, Miss Glegg, the Misses Bell, and last but not least, Miss Sayer, now Mrs Verdon Dearden.

Hospitality.—Hospitality has been kindly provided for speakers and workers by Mrs Pagan, the Misses Raeburn, Mrs Eddington, the Misses Henderson, Miss Begbie, and others.

Speakers.—The thanks of the Society are due to the following speakers :---Mrs Shaw M'Laren, Miss Hilda Cotterill, Miss Sayer, Mr Wm. Johnston, Mrs Johnston, Mr Williamson, and Councillor Graham.

In conclusion, we may congratulate ourselves on the fact that through all these troubled months the suffrage flag has been kept flying by the Society. It has not been flaunted aggressively in the faces of those who differ from us, but we have never forgotten, and we have tried not to let others forget, that we are doing our work for the State as suffragists as well as Britons; and we trust that ere long the flag we have followed will lead us through service to freedom-to freedom which we value most dearly, because it will enable us to render a fuller and more efficient service to our country and the Empire.
