that I regard human suffrage as a great
reserve moral force to be utilized
in God's good time which sometimes seems
to me to be a long time in coming
but since Hopkins & myself have
formed a Human League which
may work towards the end which
you desire.

In our case I hope you will never
find me giving an uncertain sound
in that matter.

Papers are being pulverized & I am
glad of it.

I shall be very glad to have a talk
to you about this & many other things
