Mary Bulbrew, one of the Aud ence, being of the Payth af sathe Gutes in the tiveds de firedthem to bee alf with hor the mix movoing? and vatery Sermen they fhould hive good fir Pig to brdake faft, befiecs a cup of Sick ori Claret to wath ie down: They all agreed unto it, and making ule of allthe Rheronick which they were borne unto, they gave herthanks, and loforthattime a Boutle of Ale, ot two being devoured, they departed every one to their owne houfes. The next morning they mats alhoge ther at the houfe of Mary Bilbrow, whote husband was a good honeft Bricklayer; and to foone as they came within che doors of her houfe, fie brought them all into her Parlour, as hecealled it, and inftead of fools and eufhions, theehad provided before hand, three Brickes apiece for them to fit upon, herroafon was this, fled thought thicy would not fit mush, becaufe wtomen to good inftructions love flanding : her Budpit was framed very fubtantially ot Brick, to highthat fearce any thing but het franding up tippet could be feen.
