My dear Tom

I am so wondering how you are all getting on during the coal strike - he is much upset business very much. I am quite well - but should love to see you all. I am thinking of you at home with the children this afternoon. I hope dear father had fore to July. I expect you will bring in the stall in the morning about old Mother sitting in her chair. It is in a chair in a cell. There are some women outside pushing the Court Yard - by Monday on a chair

I can see them through my
windows and I think too little
Markie would like to come & help
them. It has been rather dull.
Today for we went out for
exercise this morning - so I am
lazier a long afternoon with no
work to break it up. There is a
very good boy in a cell in the
distance. He sings through his
bars, windows for our entertainment.

Someday we shall have a comic
opera composed for representations
of prison life. Have not heard from
you since you left. Hope all is
well though. One lunch of daffodils
I gave to one of the connected prisoners
the other lunch I gave to my cell & my
love gives me such pleasures.
I have just my counterpart on my
cell floor as a carpet and it looks
quite comfortable. There are four
women doctors in the two of

them. Shall think of you all
day tomorrow. Do hope my dear
little pup will not think I have deserted
him. Tell dear father to draw me
something on a post card & dear Dad
send me a little sketch of the white
seat. Give my love & thanks to Frank.
Hope Marie is not much with Betty.

Goodbye my dear. Don't use Lammers
on your way let her go.
