# Association of University Women Teachers

## PREFACE.

IN the Report of 1895 issued by the Royal Commission on Secondary Education, the Association of University Women Teachers is quoted as one of the earliest women's organisations of Secondary Teachers. The Association was founded in January, 1883, on a suggestion made by the late Miss A. J. Clough, then Principal of Newnham College. Membership was from the outset limited to teachers who had received a University Education, and the growth and progress of the Association in its early days was entirely due to the thoughtful efforts of the founders, their insistence on a high standard, and their realisation of a common aim and interest and the sense of responsibility involved. Miss A. J. Clough was President of the Association from its foundation until her death in 1892.

Even at an early date, the objects of the Association covered a large field, including discussions of educational questions, conferences with similar bodies, social meetings, etc., the careful watching of the educational market, and the providing of Members with work as Lecturers, Teachers, Examiners and Inspectors. The success of the Association in its efforts to advise its Members and assist them to improve their status and remuneration is well known.

The Association has been incorporated as a "Company not for Profit Limited by Guarantee" under the Companies (Consolidation) Act, 1908, and since the incorporation its aims are set forth in much wider terms, more in accordance with the actual work done, *e.g.*, to promote the cause of education generally; to protect and improve the status and to further the legitimate professional interests of women teachers; to initiate and promote, or oppose, measures, legislative or administrative, in Parliament or elsewhere; to take part in, or send delegates to, meetings, conferences, etc.; to promote thrift among teachers, and to purchase or subscribe for the grant of annuities by any Assurance Company authorised to grant life annuities or pensions, etc., etc. While attending to these varied interests the Association never loses sight of its special aim: to improve the status and standing of that section of the profession which it represents.

The Association consists of a President, Ordinary Members and Honorary Members. Ordinary Membership of the Association

is limited to women teachers who are graduates of a University of Great Britain or Ireland, or who hold the equivalent certificate of Oxford or Cambridge.\* Honorary Members are elected by the Committee under conditions laid down in Articles 9 and 10. The affairs of the Association are administered by an Executive Committee of 12 Ordinary Members and a President, elected by the Association. The latter may be either an Honorary or an Ordinary Member, and is elected annually; the retiring President is eligible for re-election, but no person may be President for more than two consecutive years. The other officers are the Secretary and the Hon. Treasurer, who are appointed by the Committee, and have no seats on the Committee *ex-officio*. The Members of Committee are arranged on a rota in three equal Divisions, and in each year the Division which has been longest in office retires. The Committee has power to appoint Sub-Committees, and to make, repeal and alter bye-laws for the conduct of the general affairs of the Association. The Articles of Association provide for a Business Meeting to be held once a year; also for Ordinary and Extraordinary General Meetings of Members. Meetings of the Executive Committee take place every month, or more often when necessary.

There are 26 Honorary Members. In 1883 the number of Ordinary Members was 76; it is now 2,787. These include Heads of University and Training Colleges, Head and Assistant Mistresses of Public and Private Schools, Inspectors, Lecturers, etc., who possess the University qualifications required for membership. The work has developed in many directions, as the perusal of the 37 Annual Reports of the Association will show. The statistics collected and published for the last 20 years of the salaries obtained by Teachers through the help of the Association have served many a useful purpose in various Educational Conferences. The Office is frequently referred to by Education Authorities and Teachers for information and advice on a great variety of matters, such as agreements, scales of salaries, sick leave, payment during absence through illness, pensions, etc.

A few instances of action taken by the Association of University Women Teachers in the interests of education will best explain the work it is doing. In 1888 the Association was instrumental in the formation of a Committee to investigate the low salaries paid at the time to Assistant Mistresses in Public Schools. The report of this Committee was followed by an address given to Members in General Meeting by Miss Clara Collet, late of the Board of Trade, on "Salaries of Women Teachers," which was reprinted in the "Journal of Education" in 1890. In 1890 the Association held a series of Discussion Meetings on the then contemplated Register for Teachers, in 1891 gave evidence before the Select Committee on the "Teachers' Registration and Organisation Bills" before

Parliament, and in 1892 was invited by the Association of Head Mistresses to a Conference on the "Salaries Question." When the Secondary Education Bill was before Parliament the Association was represented at a Conference on "Secondary Education" convened by the University of Cambridge, and when the County of London opened its Secondary Schools the Association took part in a Conference called by the Assistant Masters' Association on "Salaries of London Secondary Teachers." On various occasions the Association has sent deputations to the Board of Education.

Miss Gray, High Mistress, St. Paul's Girls' School, is the President of the Association. The Registered Office of the Association is 108 Victoria Street, London, S.W. 1.

## THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Executive Committee regret to report a decrease in the number of members this year, *i.e.*, 2,787 as against 2,851 last year. The increased cost of the necessaries of life has caused many people to examine their budgets closely, to see if there is any item they can cut out, but the Committee hope that members of the Association will not withdraw their support for this reason, especially as the subscription has not been raised since the Association was incorporated in 1910.

With a view to keeping in touch with members in the provinces, the Committee arranged social meetings in Manchester and Leeds. These were held in February and were much appreciated. Sir Henry Hadow's address on "The Place of Music in Education" was particularly delightful and stimulating.

The Committee record with pleasure the election of Sir Henry Hadow, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Sheffield, as Honorary Member of the Association. They also gladly welcome four new members from the Overseas Dominions, one from Columbia University and one from Zürich.

The Committee record with great regret the death of *Mrs. Humphry Ward*, Honorary Member of the Association, on 24th March, 1920. The loss of *Mrs. Ward* will be most deeply felt in literary circles, but her keen interest in educational matters, especially in connection with play-centres for slum children, will cause her name to be long remembered with gratitude and respect. The Committee also record with regret the deaths of *Miss E. L. Clarke*, Cambridge, on 25th April, 1920; *Miss M. A. Gilliland*, London, late Headmistress of Aske's Haberdashers' Girls' School, Acton, on 17th May, 1920; and of *Miss S. J. Hale*, Cambridge, late Principal of the Edge Hill Training College, on 1st April, 1920; both *Miss Gilliland* and *Miss Hale* were Life Members of the Association, and eminent and inspiring teachers.

*Miss G. Bracken*, who retired by rotation from the Executive Committee, was unable, to the great regret of her colleagues, to stand for re-election. *Miss Richards*, who was elected in place of *Miss Bracken*, is the Principal of Stockwell Training College, and thus represents one of the most important branches of the profession.

The Executive Committee has met 9 times during the year and 11 Sub-Committee meetings have also been held.

The financial position of the Association is not altogether satisfactory. Some apprehension was felt at the beginning of the year as to whether it would be possible to continue the work of the Association without raising the annual subscription, which the Committee were most unwilling to propose. It was decided to make a slight increase in the appointment fees charged for posts at salaries of over £200 (see footnote)\*, and the Committee hope that the increase of revenue so obtained may be sufficient to meet the unavoidable increase in expenditure, but a substantial increase in the number of members would be the most satisfactory solution of the problem. Members of ten years' standing or more are urged to become Life Members at the commuted fee of £2 10s.

The Sub-Committee on Pensions met twice to consider the question of the most urgently needed amendments to the School Teachers (Superannuation) Act, 1918. It was agreed that in the interests of the Empire it was most desirable that service in recognized schools in any British Colony or Dependency should be pensionable; such service is now regarded as qualifying service and there is a possibility that it will be made pensionable before long. The representatives of the various Overseas Dominions have been asked by the Association to urge the Board of Education to make this change.

These fees cannot be halved in any circumstances.

A small Conference of Head and Assistant mistresses (arranged by the Association of University Women Teachers) was held at the Women's Institute in Victoria Street on the 25th October, 1919, on the subject of the questions set in the Higher School Examination. Examples of questions of a type unsuitable to boys and girls of eighteen were quoted, and a protest was sent to the Council for External Students of the University of London. A plea for the exemption from the Intermediate Examination of students who had taken a London Higher School Certificate was sent to the Registrar of the Academic Council for Internal Students.

Two of the most important problems in the educational world at present are the shortage of teachers and the standardising of salaries. The latter will it is hoped be satisfactorily dealt with by the publication of the report of the Joint Committee on Salaries, presided over by Lord Burnham (five members of which are members of the A.U.W.T.), but the former seems impossible of solution. It is interesting to note that one of the reasons deterring young graduates from entering the profession is said to be the difficulty of maintaining discipline in schools which are run on democratic lines (self-government). A reason more frequently given is the narrowness of a teacher's life during term-time, for which even the long holidays do not compensate.

The Hospital Branch still needs new members; some subscribers naturally drop off year by year, and the wastage must be made good if the branch is to be kept up. Only two members have made use of the bed this year, which has therefore been free for other professional women. The Secretary of the South London Hospital for Women sends cordial thanks to our members for their support.

## THE ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING,

24th JANUARY, 1920.

The 36th Annual Business Meeting of the Association was held on Saturday, 24th January, 1920, at Bedford College, Regent's Park, N.W. 1, at 3 p.m.

The President, *Miss Stephen*, took the Chair and 90 members were present.

*The Secretary* gave out notices of various lectures and meetings, and read the names of 53 members who, having been elected since July, 1919, were not entitled to vote at the meeting. (Articles of Association, paragraph 44).

On the motion of *Miss D. Ward*, seconded by *Miss Miller*, the Minutes of the Annual Business Meeting, held on 25th January, 1919, were taken as read and signed by the President.

*Miss Tuke* moved, and *Miss Rich* seconded, the adoption of the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts and the *President* informed the meeting that the Report could now be discussed.

*Miss Alice Woods* said she would like to make one suggestion which arose from looking at the Table of Appointments. Applications for teachers had been made to the number of 999 and the appointments made had been only 228. That seemed a very remarkable discrepancy. She thought it might probably be explained if there were a third column added, stating how many members had applied for posts. She did not know if this suggestion were possible, but if so, she thought it would be very useful to have such a column.

*The President* said she would ask members to bring forward in turn any points they wished to comment on, so that all the questions could be answered together; in the meantime, she would ask the Honorary Treasurer to speak on the financial position of the Association.

The Honorary Treasurer, *Miss Coward*, reported that the Secondary School Teachers' War Relief Fund was now closed. All the necessary capital had been subscribed, and the official announcement of the closure of the fund would be made after the Accounts had been audited in March.

With regard to the financial position of the Association, she was glad that it was satisfactory, in that there was a balance on the year's work. That was just short of £20. Comparison with previous years showed that the income was very slightly diminished, but on the other hand expenses had been kept down remarkably well. The chief increase was in the matter of salaries, but she was sure all the members would fully approve of this. With regard to the coming year, she thought they must be willing to risk a further diminution until prices were somewhat more settled. On the formation of the Association they were advised to accumulate a capital of £1,000; since then, Stock to the value of nearly £1,500 had been bought and there was, besides, £200 on deposit at the Bank, so that it was unnecessary to accumulate more capital at present. All that was required was to meet current expenses and the committee thought that, instead of raising the subscription, a step which everyone felt should be avoided if possible, this might be done by charging a slightly higher appointment fee for the better-paid posts. This did not require the sanction of a general meeting, as it came under the Bye-Laws and could be determined by the Executive Committee. In conclusion, she wished to thank the Secretary and Assistant Secretary for their arduous work for the Association.

*The President* said that if no one had any further questions to ask, she would ask the Secretary to reply to *Miss Woods'* question about the Appointments.

*The Secretary* said that it would be possible to keep a record of the number of members applying for posts and if the members wished it she would be quite willing to do so, but she thought the real explanation of the discrepancy between the number of applications for teachers and the appointments made lay in the fact that the greater number of public school posts were filled through advertisement. Frequently these posts were filled by members of the Association who saw the advertisements in the Educational Supplement of the "Times" and in the "Journal of Education" before they had definitely decided to apply to the Registry for work. Most Educational Authorities rightly insisted on the advertisement of posts and it not infrequently happened that Headmistresses only applied to the Association after advertising

the vacancy. She thought one other point should be mentioned, though no questions had been asked about it, and that was the question of Whitley Councils or their equivalent for the teaching profession. The London Teachers' Association had called a Conference of various Associations on this subject and had explained that the Association of University Women Teachers could not be invited to take part, because they were neither a London Association, nor had they a London Branch. She wished to thank the Honorary Treasurer for her invaluable advice and assistance in the financial work of the Association.

The adoption of the Annual Report was then put to the meeting and carried *nem. con.*

*Miss Bracken* then proposed: "That Mrs. Harold Cox be appointed auditor for the year 1919-1920 and receive the fee of £7 7s." *Miss Bracken* said she thought the Association very fortunate in securing Mrs. Cox's services as auditor, she felt that all the members would agree that it was only right that the fee should be raised to 7 guineas, in view of the general raising of fees and salaries. The motion was seconded by *Miss Quartly* and carried unanimously.

*The President* then stated that she had great pleasure in announcing to the meeting, that Miss F. R. Gray, High Mistress of St. Paul's Girls' School, who had been unanimously proposed by the Committee, had consented to be President for the year 1919-20.

With regard to the Committee, of the four Members retiring by rotation, Miss Coward, Miss Sandford and Miss Sexton had consented to serve again. Miss S. E. S. Richards, Principal of Stockwell Training College, had been nominated for the fourth vacancy. No other nominations having been received, no ballot was necessary.

*Miss Stephen* then gave the following address.

"I must begin by saying how much I have enjoyed the privilege of being President of this Association for the last two years. It has been a pleasure to me to work with the other members of the Committee, and a pleasure too to see something of the work which the Association does, to hear of the various experiences of its members, and to know something of their opinions on many of the matters which must be considered in these days by anyone who is interested in women's education. I am pleased to think that my successor as President is a member of my own College, and one who seems to be specially well placed for carrying forward the cause that means so much to us all.

I am told that the outgoing President is expected to deliver an address and I do not wish to fail in any part of my duty, though I should have preferred to go on at once to the lecture we are to hear shortly. But I am glad to have an opportunity of speaking to this company.

I have sometimes observed that there is one suggestion which is likely to meet everywhere with a ready response. It is "let us now praise famous men." On this occasion I want to propose that we should praise one famous woman, Miss A. J. Clough, the first Principal of Newnham College, and the founder and first President of this Association. I mention her to-day because this is her centenary. She was born on January 20th, 1820, so that we are to-day within a week of her 100th birthday. It seems a good occasion to look back over the 100 years and consider what has happened concerning the education of women during that time. At the date of Miss Clough's birth, women's education was but little considered. There were few good girls' schools, and no women's College, either in England or in the Southern States of America, where Miss Clough was born, and the private teachers, who had to give what education they could, were thus left without the means of gaining education themselves. In 1820, the only Tripos taken at Cambridge was the Mathematical, so that even if women had been admitted as students there, the number would have been restricted by the want of mathematical ability in many women of great power in other directions.

Miss Clough, as she appeared in later life, had two specially strong characteristics; one was the firmest belief in the importance of education; the other a most lively interest in human beings, as individuals, or as members of groups. Her belief in education was not the less strong, it was perhaps even the stronger, on account of her not having been highly educated herself. She had gained what knowledge she could on her own account, valued it as a hardly-won possession, and was well aware of the advantage she would have found in further opportunities for study. Her keen interest in young women made her anxious to do everything in her power to give them the chance of a good education. After she came to England she met many men and women likeminded with herself, and took counsel with them to good purpose. In 1870, when she was 50 years old, beginnings had been made in many directions. The Cambridge Local Examinations had been established, and Girton College had been open at Hitchin for a year, and a course of lectures for women had been arranged at Cambridge for the Lent term 1870, the lectures being given by some of the most distinguished men in the University. Such was the prospect half-way through the century with which we are concerned, and we see the foundation there of much that we have to-day.

In 1871 Miss Clough took charge of the house which was the forerunner of Newnham College. She was Principal of the College from its foundation till her death in 1892. It was she who suggested the founding of this Association and she was herself its first President. It was an object of special interest to her in the later years of her life, and I think it may be said that the objects she had in view in founding it, have not been lost sight of during the years that have followed her death, by those who have guided



the affairs of the Association. But, though much has indeed been done in the last fifty years, and we have only to look round to see on all sides the fruit that has grown from the seed sown by the pioneers, there is much still pressing for attention, and this Association has a well-defined part to play. It stands between the University women teachers who are its members, and the Universities to which they belong: it should represent each to other, and help in keeping a close link between them.

The present moment is full of interest for those who are working for the cause of education; it is a time of changes, of beginnings, of opportunities. The number of learners is increasing continually; the number of teachers must in one way or another be increased to correspond. We cannot but be reminded of the days of the Renaissance, when the learning that had found its home in Constantinople was carried through Europe by the dispersal of the learned men who had lived in that centre of the Empire. What has happened now is not connected with any special geographical centre. It is a social centre that has opened out. The number of people in all ranks of life who have time, opportunity, and means to study, has suddenly increased greatly and that knowledge and learning which in the past were likely to be enjoyed only by a few may now be spread abroad much more widely, with the result that a large number of persons will probably develop unexpected powers and in their turn produce what will be valuable to others. We who belong to the body of educators may find ourselves in a position resembling to some extent that of the first scholars who carried the love of learning through the cities of Europe. Besides this we have to take steps, as has been said, to secure teachers for the new scholars. We shall, naturally, in the first place, do our best to secure a large number of those who are leaving College or School; and we may succeed in enlisting besides well-educated and able women who have not so far taken an active part in this special work of helping to pass on knowledge and understanding to the new seekers after these possessions.

It seems to me that by carrying out our own familiar aims we shall be forwarding the two objects that meant so much to Miss Clough. We are aiming at bringing good education to bear on the lives of ordinary human beings to as great an extent as possible. Believing as we do in the results of a good education, we hope to see it fulfilling its double function in this country, preparing some of those who acquire it to advance scholarship and gain knowledge for the sake of learning, truth and understanding; helping those who are living ordinary lives to make them more satisfactory and more interesting. So I feel that we may make a widespread appeal for the widespread help we require. We appeal to those who might join the Association and have not done so, to join it now, and to give us the benefit of their suggestions and ideas; to parents to take advantage of all the possibilities open to them in bringing up their children; to teachers to present what they have to teach in such a way as to make their pupils really interested and keen;

to those who have influence in such matters to take whatever opportunity offers of forwarding legislation and administration of the right kind when educational questions are concerned.

We appeal to everyone for the help of personal interest.

In these various ways I suggest that we should carry out the injunction to praise famous men with regard to our founder."

The business part of the meeting being concluded, *Sir Arthur Quiller-Couch*, King Edward VII. Professor of English Literature at the University of Cambridge, then gave a most interesting address on "The Burden of Books."

*Miss Tarrant* proposed a vote of thanks to *Sir Arthur Quiller-Couch*, which was carried by acclamation.

Votes of thanks to the retiring President and to *Miss Tuke* were also carried by acclamation, and the Members adjourned to tea.

#### MEETING AT THE CONFERENCE OF EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATIONS.

8TH JANUARY, 1920.

An open Social Meeting was held at the Conference of Educational Associations at University College, and *Professor John Adams* gave a most interesting address on "Tests of Intelligence." The chair was taken by *Miss Alice Woods*. The room was crowded and admission had to be refused to late comers for want of space. *Professor Adams'* address was published in the Report of the Conference of Educational Associations, a copy of which can be had on loan from the Office of the Association.

#### SOCIAL MEETING AT LEEDS.

10TH FEBRUARY, 1920.

By the kindness of *Miss Scotson Clark* a very pleasant Social Meeting was held at the Chapel Allerton High School, Leeds. The meeting began with tea and conversation, after which *Dr. Strong*, Professor of Education in the University of Leeds, gave a short address, and the Secretary, *Mrs. Brough*, said a few words on the work of the Association.

#### SOCIAL MEETING AT MANCHESTER.

12TH FEBRUARY, 1920.

This meeting was held at the Victoria University by kind permission of *Sir Henry Miers*. Tea was provided before the address, which gave an opportunity for the *Secretary* to make the acquaintance of the members present. An address on "The place

of Music in Education" was given by *Sir Henry Hadow*. Sir Henry reminded his audience of the important part played by music in the education of a gentleman of the Elizabethan period, which was of the most glorious in the annals of our country. He contrasted this with the neglect of music in the present day, giving as an instance Mr. Richmond's "Curriculum," in which music is not even mentioned. Sir Henry pleaded eloquently for a place in the school time-table for two things totally different but equally important:—(1) Choral singing; (2) Musical appreciation. The lecture was of the deepest interest and was greatly appreciated.

The thanks of the Association are due to *Dr. Sheavyn* and *Miss Gearing* for the excellent arrangements made, and to *Miss Grant* who kindly took the chair in the unavoidable absence of *Dr. Sheavyn*, and above all to *Sir Henry Hadow* for his kindness in giving such a delightful address.

#### DISCUSSION MEETINGS.

##### (1) SELF-GOVERNMENT IN SCHOOLS, 30TH OCTOBER, 1919.

This meeting was held at the Burlington Girls' School, *Miss Wigg* took the chair, and there was a keen discussion. The case against Self-government was most ably stated by *Miss H. L. Powell*, who began with a just criticism of the term. She thought the system should be entitled "Democratic Self-government." She considered government needed more detachment and riper judgment than were to be found in young people. These qualities might be developed in children, but it would be at too great a cost as it would be forcing them to premature development. Responsibility should be gradually introduced by means of the prefect system. Democratic government cut at the roots of all that was desirable in building up character and tended to diminish respect and reverence to elders. *Miss Moberly Bell* said she thought that the conditions of life had changed, and methods of education must also change. Girls had to live in a democratic world and therefore it was necessary to prepare them for democracy. She thought children had more and not less respect for their teachers after they had learnt something of the difficulties of governing. The responsibilities of the staff were certainly increased. The children were not allowed to run the school, they were merely invited to share in running it. She thought there was less strain on individuals than under the prefect system. Other speakers were *Miss Zachary* and *Miss Alice Woods*. It was requested that a third meeting on the same subject should be arranged.

##### (2) CONTINUATION SCHOOLS, 20TH NOVEMBER, 1920.

This meeting was held at Whitelands Training College, *Miss Mercier* taking the chair. *Miss Mercier* read an interesting account of a continuation school lately started at Leigh, Lancashire. *Miss Bazely* briefly described her experience of a school in Bristol, laying

great stress on the importance of making the school as much like a club as possible. *Miss Richards* gave an account of an afternoon continuation class which had been started at Stockwell. Lessons were given in domestic science and literature and were patronised not by elder girls, but by young married women, willing to swallow the powder of literature for the sake of the jam of domestic science. In answer to questions, *Miss Bazely* gave some useful information on the subject of training, length of session, etc.

##### (3) THE UNPOPULARITY OF THE TEACHING PROFESSION AND THE CAUSES FOR IT, 26TH FEBRUARY, 1920.

*Miss Crosby* took the chair, the meeting being held in the Carlyle Secondary School. *Miss Strudwick* opened the discussion by enumerating some of the signs of the unpopularity of teaching as a profession. As to the reasons for this unpopularity, she thought money was not the most important; the attitude of the community towards education was utterly wrong. Teachers were treated as a race apart and could therefore not enjoy a normal social life: hence they were apt to become "Schoolmarms." There was also the great physical strain for which even long holidays hardly compensated. In time past the feeling of the honour and dignity of the profession had been some compensation, but this feeling had lessened. So much mechanical detail was involved that teaching had now become less human; it was no longer regarded as an art, yet it partook of the dramatic art. The teacher was, as it were, on the stage, setting a fresh scene for each lesson and creating an atmosphere with each class. It was easier to enumerate the drawbacks to the profession than to devise means to remedy them, but something might be done with regard to social life. It was not a bad plan for some members of the staff to be appointed from the neighbourhood so that they were able to enjoy a normal home life. Head mistresses in provincial towns might also do more than they had done in the past to secure some social life for their staff.

*Miss Ewart*, *Miss D. W. Sprules*, *Miss A. Robertson*, *Miss Moberly Bell* and other speakers followed. It was generally agreed that the difficulty of having any social life in term-time was one of the great reasons that deterred girls from entering the profession, another being the fear of being unable to maintain discipline in schools which had adopted Self-government. The following resolution, proposed by *Miss A. Robertson* and seconded by *Miss Moberly Bell*, was carried by 7 votes to 2: "That it is not in the best interests of the teaching profession that bursaries be awarded to scholars (13 to 16 years) on condition that their parents pledge them to the teaching profession."

##### (4) SELF-GOVERNMENT IN SCHOOLS, 18TH MARCH, 1920.

*Miss Alice Woods* took the chair at this meeting which was held by kind permission of *Miss Bannister* at St. Martin's High

School and was very well attended. The subject of Self-government was discussed in detail, the conditions of success, reasons of failure, means of preparation, and the results were all dealt with. The remarks of *The Chairman* and of *Miss Moberly Bell* were especially helpful.

### THE REGISTRY.

It will be observed that there is a marked discrepancy between the number of applications received and the number of posts filled, and the reason is not far to seek. Nearly all Educational Authorities advertise their vacant posts, and in many cases the posts are filled by mistresses who apply from having seen the advertisement. In some cases the fact of seeing a tempting advertisement induces a mistress to apply for a post when otherwise she would not have thought of changing. The columns of advertisements which appear weekly in the *Times Educational Supplement* have not unnaturally affected the number of posts filled by the Association. The Committee appeal to those Headmistresses who seek the aid of the Registry in filling their vacancies to send notices of their requirements to the Secretary BEFORE advertising or applying to commercial agencies. If this is not done, a small charge, not exceeding 2s. 6d., will be made in addition to the Registry fee.

The Committee would also like to remind Headmistresses that a room at 108 Victoria Street is available for interviews any day between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. (Saturdays 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.). In future a small fee will be charged.

In response to a suggestion made at the Annual Meeting an addition showing the number of mistresses applying for work in different subjects has been added to Section I of the Tables.

Salaries have considerably increased, the highest being £90 in excess of any given last year. The figures given in the Tables do not include any bonus, which is in some cases very high exceeding 50% of the salary.

For the first time since the beginning of the war applications for mistresses from abroad have been numerous. The number of candidates for these posts has been only slightly greater than it was during the war. Applications have been received from:—
