## PREFACE.

PN the Report of 1895 issued by the Royal Commission on Secondary Education, the Association of University Women Teachers is quoted as one of the earliest women's organisations of Secondary Teachers. The Association was founded in January, 1883, on a suggestion made by the late Miss A. J. Clough, then Principal of Newnham College. Membership was from the outset limited to teachers who had received a University Education, and the growth and progress of the Association in its early days was entirely due to the thoughtful efforts of the founders, their insistence on a high standard, and their realisation of a common aim and interest and the sense of responsibility involved. Miss A. J. Clough was President of the Association from its foundation until her death in 1892 .

Even at an early date, the objects of the Association covered a large field, including discussions of educational questions, conferences with similar bodies, social meetings, etc., the careful watching of the educational market, and the providing of Members with work as Lecturers, Teachers, Examiners and Inspectors. The success of the Association in its efforts to advise its Members and assist them to improve their status and remuneration is well known.

The Association has been incorporated as a "Company not for Profit Limited by Guarantee " under the Companies (Consolidation) Act, 1908, and since the incorporation its aims are set forth in much wider terms, more in accordance with the actual work done, e.g., to promote the cause of education generally ; to protect and improve the status and to further the legitimate professional interests of women teachers ; to initiate and promote, or oppose, measures, legislative or administrative, in Parliament or elsewhere ; to take part in, or send delegates to, meetings, conferences, etc. ; to promote thrift among teachers, and to purchase or subscribe for the grant of annuities by any Assurance Company authorised to grant life annuities or pensions, etc., etc. While attending to these varied interests the Association never loses sight of its special aim : to improve the status and standing of that section of the profession which it represents.

The Association consists of a President, Ordinary Members and Honorary Members. Ordinary Membership of the Association
is limited to women teachers who are graduates of a University of Great Britain or Ireland, or who hold the equivalent certificate of Oxford or Cambridge.* Honorary Members are elected by the Committee under conditions laid down in Articles 9 and io. The affairs of the Association are administered by an Executive Committee of 12 Ordinary Members and a President, elected by the Association. The latter may be either an Honorary or an Ordinary Member, and is elected annually; the retiring President is eligible for re-election, but no person may be President for more than two consecutive years. The other officers are the Secretary and the Hon. Treasurer, who are appointed by the Committee, and have no seats on the Committee ex-officio. The Members of Committee are arranged on a rota in three equal Divisions, and in each year the Division which has been longest in office retires. The Committee has power to appoint SubCommittees, and to make, repeal and alter bye-laws for the conduct of the general affairs of the Association. The Articles of Association provide for a Business Meeting to be held once a year ; also for Ordinary and Extraordinary General Meetings of Members. Meetings of the Executive Committee take place every month, or more often when necessary.

There are 22 Honorary Members. In 1883 the number of Ordinary Members was 76 ; it is now 2,634 . These include Heads of University and Training Colleges, Head and Assistant Mistresses of Public and Private Schools, Inspectors, Lecturers, etc., who possess the University qualifications required for membership. The work has developed in many directions, as the perusal of the 39 Annual Reports of the Association will show. The statistics collected and published for the last 22 years of the salaries obtained by Teachers through the help of the Association have served many a useful purpose in various Educational Conferences. The Office is frequently referred to by Education Authorities and Teachers for information and advice on a great variety of matters, such as agreements, sick leave, payment during absence through illness, pensions, etc.

A few instances of action taken by the Association of University Women Teachers in the interests of education will best explain the work it is doing. In 1888 the Association was instrumental in the formation of a Committee to investigate the low salaries paid at the time to Assistant Mistresses in Public Schools. The report of this Committee was followed by an address given to Members in General Meeting by Miss Clara Collet, late of the Board of Trade, on "Salaries of Women Teachers," which was reprinted in the "Journal of Education" in 1890 . In 1890 the Association held a series of Discussion Meetings on the then contemplated Register for Teachers, in 1891 gave evidence before the Select Committee on the "Teachers' Registration and Organisation Bills" before

Parliament, and in 1892 was invited by the Association of Head Mistresses to a Conference on the "Salaries Question." When the Secondary Education Bill was before Parliament the Association was represented at a Conference on "Secondary Education" convened by the University of Cambridge, and when the County of London opened its Secondary Schools the Association took part in a Conference called by the Assistant Masters' Association on "Salaries of London Secondary Teachers." On various occasions the Association has sent deputations to the Board of Education.

Latterly the Association has been äble to serve the interests of education in general by arranging conferences on such subjects as Pschyo-Analysis, the Teaching of Scripture and the Teaching of Science, with a view to stimulating interest and keeping members in touch with modern methods.

The Executive Committee have much pleasure in reporting that among the members elected during the year are Miss Lodge, M.A., Principal of Westfield College, and Miss Grier, M.A., Principal of Lady Margaret Hall, Oxford. Miss Lodge also consented to be co-opted on to the Executive Committee in place of Miss Sandford, who was obliged, to the regret of the Committee, to resign owing to pressure of other work. Miss Sandford has served on the Committee since 1910, and her advice and assistance have constantly been of inestimable value to the Association. Miss Michaelis, who was elected in January, 1921, also resigned in July as she was unable to attend the meetings this year.

In spite of the number of elections having risen from 168 last year to 206 this year, there is a decrease in the total number of members, i.e., 2634 as against 2688 . The decrease is due to the abnormal number of members, who without definitely resigning, have failed to pay their subscriptions. The Committee would remind those who hesitate to continue subscribing that if they cease to be members and afterwards wish to be re-elected, they have to pay $10 /-$, which is equivalent to two years' annual subscription, as an entrance fee.

The Committee record with great regret the death of the Rt. Hon. Viscount Bryce of Dechmont, O.M., D.C.L., Hon. Member of the Association: also of Miss E. E. Constance Jones, Cambridge, late Mistress of Girton College : also of Miss F. E. C. Fidler, Manchester.

The financial position of the Association has been adversely affected by the expense of moving the office. The move was a necessity, because the landlords in Victoria Street, on the expiry of the five years' lease, demanded an increase in the rent which was beyond the means of the Association. The expense of moving and notifying the change of address was considerable, and there is consequently a deficit in the Revenue Account. In other respects the move is advantageous: the new rooms are much lighter and more airy, and being situated in an educational quarter will, it is hoped, prove even more convenient than those in Westminster.

The Executive Committee invited representatives from Girls' Public Secondary Schools in London to attend a meeting at the office on 15 th December, 192 I, to consider the propriety of protesting against a reduction of national expenditure on education. At the meeting a resolution was passed asking the Executive Committee, to approach the Headmasters', Headmistresses'. Assistant Masters' and Assistant Mistresses' Associations and request them to hold a public meeting of protest. The next day a Manifesto on this subject was issued by the Teachers' Registration Council, and the Executive Committee decided to give their most cordial support to the Manifesto, and to urge the Teachers' Registration Council to hold a public meeting of protest in London. The Manifesto was widely circulated and many signatures were obtained; but it was judged
inadvisable to hold a public meeting without moredefinite information as to the nature of the reduction proposed. Ultimately the protests of educational associations and of individuals caused considerable modification of the reductions originally proposed by the Geddes' Committee. Representatives of the Association attended the Meeting of Protest organised by the Workers' Education Association in March.

The subject of compulsory contributory pensions has during the past few months exercised the minds of those teaching in grantaided schools. Questions in connection with the government scheme will, we hope, be discussed at the Annual Meeting of the Association on 27 th January, 1923.

The Executive Committee appeal most urgently for further subscriptions to the Hospital Branch. The branch provides an excellent form of insurance in the case of severe illness involving an operation. In addition it helps to support a thoroughly good and economically managed hospital which provides for, the needs of women of all classes. Owing to the modern construction and excellent site of the South London Hospital for Women, the patients enjoy exceptional advantages, superior to those obtainable in many nursing homes. The hospital is therefore a great boon to professional women and has been used by members of this Association each year since its opening. Last year an urgent case for operation was admitted within 24 hours although the member was not living in Town. At least 40 more annual subscribers are needed to continue the working of the branch. Subscribers are admitted to the public wards free of charge. A charge of from $\notin 22 \mathrm{~s}$. to $£ 44 \mathrm{~s}$. a week is made for a separate cubicle or private room, which represents a reduction of $£^{2} 2$ 2s. on the ordinary hospital charges. There are no charges for dressings or fees for operator or anæsthetist. Cases of non-infectious illness requiring skilled nursing can be admitted if desired.

The problem of religious education, the subject of Canon Barnes admirable address at out Annual Meeting, was further considered in June at a Conference on "The Teaching of Scripture in Schools". The Conference was held at University College, and the President, Miss Winifred Smith, took the chair. Dr. Douglas Adam (Presbyterian Minister) opened the morning session and Bishop Gore the afternoon session. Their inspiring addresses brought forth most interesting comments. The Conference was very well attended and the friendly discussion which followed testified to the general interest felt. There was a publishers' exhibition of books connected with the subject. A report of the proceedings was printed in the "Challenge" for 23rd June. After the Conference Miss Smith kindly entertained the members to tea in the refectory.

A second Conference has been arranged in conjunction with the Association of Science Teachers on the Teaching of Science in Schools and Colleges. The Conference will be held on November

25 th at University College. Reports will be found in "Times Educational Supplement," " Journal of Education," " Nature" and the "School Science Review."

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## THE ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING,

5th Jandary, 1922.

The 38th Annual Business Meeting of the Association was held on Thursday, 5 th January, 1922, at University College, Gower Street, W.C. I, in connection with the Conference of Educational Associations.

The President, Miss F. R. Gray, J.P., took the chair, and 64 members were present.

The Chairman read the names of 71 members, who, having been elected since July 192. , were not entitled to vote at the meeting. (Articles of Association, paragraph 44).

On the motion of the Chairman the Minutes of the Annual Business Meeting, held on 22nd January, 1921, were taken as read and confirmed

Miss Deane moved, and Miss Meyer seconded the adoption of the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts, and the President informed the meeting that the report could now be discussed.

At the request of the Chairman, the Secretary read the statement of the Hon. Treasurer, who to her great regret was unable to be present. The Hon. Treasurer reminded the members that in the year ending November 1920, there was unfortunately a deficit on the year's work. This year, she was glad to say that without any increase of subscription there was a small surplus. (Applause). It would therefore be unnecessary to increase the subscription at present. The Treasurer also mentioned that the Secondary School Teachers' War Relief Fund was still open to receive donations.

The Secretary appealed for more members for the Hospital Branch of the Association. She pointed out that since the South London Hospital for Women had been open, there had been no year without one or more members being admitted for treatment. There were at present less than 200 members of the Hospital Branch, a very small number out of a membership of over 2,000 , nearly 1,000 of whom were living or working in London. The branch was not only of benefit to the individual members belonging, but the collective subscription was most valuable to the Hospital. All patients admitted through the Association were thoroughly satisfied with the treatment they had received and warm in their praise of the Hospital staff and general arrangements.

The Chairman said she thought that before adopting the Report and Statement of Accounts, she ought just to mention that she thought the successful and satisfactory financial position would not have been gained if it had not been for the self-denying labours of Mrs. Brough and her assistant. (Applause.) The adoption of the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts was then put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

Miss Richards proposed "that Mrs. Harold Cox be appointed Auditor for the year 192I-1922, and recenve the fee of $£ 77 s$." The motion was seconded by Miss Alice Woods and carried unanimously.

The Secretary announced that the Committee had requested Miss Winifred Smith, Tutor to the Women Students at University College, to be President, and she had kindly consented. No other nominations having been sent in, she was declared elected without a ballot. Of the four members retiring from the Committee by rotation, one only, Miss Doorly, was unable to serve again. Only one nomination having been received under Art. 20, Miss R. F. Shove, science lecturer at the Maria Gray Training College, was declared elected without ballot.

Miss Gray then gave the following address on "The Financial Position in Education"
"I have before me a time-table which is drawn up very much after the manner of a Bradshaw, which says that at 2.48 an announcement must be made, and at 2.50 the President is to begin to speak on "The Financial Position of Education." We are really a little ahead of our time, but I think perhaps I ought to begin to speak as it is always an excellent plan to have a few minutes in reserve.

I would rather have spoken about almost anything else than the financial position in education, because I share the feeling that we have found amongst so many of our members - that we do not want our time or our thoughts to be taken up so much with our financial position and financial considerations. But the question is to-day a very much larger question than merely the financial wellbeing of you or of me. It is to-day, at this moment, a question of principle. There is a possibility that the country may very shortly have to decide whether education is to be valued as the chief factor in the working out of the great problem of the reconstruction of this country ; or whether we shall go back, having learned nothing from the lessons of the war, to the attitude that we took before the war with regard to education. Everyone here would agree that we are not proud of the attitude that our country took up before the war regarding education. We are not proud of the position that our profession was given-I will not say "took" because we were tied hand and foot. It was not open to us to claim the consideration that we felt our profession demanded. The first opportunity that has come since the war is not the opportunity that we would have chosen if we could have helped it. I hope we are going to fight, but we are not going to fight on a battlefield that we would have chosen, and there is a great deal in military operations in being able to choose your battlefield.

We deeply feel, and we want to teach this nation, what education really means, what education given a fair chance can do for the nation; if we could have chosen it, we would not have been forced to try to give the lesson from this particular text, "You must
not starve the teachers." But since we have no chance, since the issue is forced upon us - we are quite certain it is going to be forced upon us-I think we must put our own personal dislike of seeming to claim our own rights on one side, and for the sake of our profession and what our profession can do for our country, we must decide on taking up a firm attitude. It is not really so much a question of whether this teacher in this particular school is not able to take a summer holiday because she does not get enough pay, or whether that teacher has to go without a very necessary operation because she feels she could not afford it and the time she would have to lie by: it is not that, though it does mean all that. It is not for that we are pleading. It is not on that ground we want to take up our stand. It is that the country will never realize what education can do, what education ought to do, and will do, if always when the need for any special bit of economy arises, education is one of the first to be deprived of the means of existence.

I have always wondered why in the old days the pioneers of the higher education of women were not alive to the financial aspect of the question regarding the new profession ; because a new profession was being created of women teachers. One regards these pioneers with reverence which would always make it impossible for us to attribute to them any but the very worthiest and highest motives. I can only suppose that they were so penetrated with the sense that teaching was its own exceeding great reward-and we all feel that-that to them it never occurred that if they had stood out and expected parents to contribute a very much larger proportion of their incomes to the teaching of their girls than they did, things would have been very different in later years. As it was, as soon as an opening was created, women poured into the teaching profession, and were very scantily paid. After a time it became so difficult that investigations were made, and it was found that practically no women, none of the rank and file of the women who were teaching in our public secondary schools, were being paid a living wage; that is a wage from which they could pay for any exceptional calls, such as sickness or for proper holidays, and put by for their old age. The fact that so many women had begun to earn increased the class of single women who had dependants upon them. As soon as a young woman began to earn, she felt that she must help younger brothers and sisters. She must help those who might become dependent on her. In many cases her parents had found it difficult to pay for her University education, and she in turn felt that she must do something for them in their old age Altogether the problem became exceedingly difficult as to how women were to go on teaching, while it was so difficult to make ends meet.

Some very small improvement was made from time to time. Then came the war, and throughout the period of the war women in the teaching profession took their share up to the full in the privation and self-denial that was expected from us all. We do not pride ourselves on that. It was simply our duty and we did it, but

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it meant that in many cases where other persons, engaged in work of public utility, were receiving incomes that did take into consideration the enormous cost of everything in war-time, women teachers received either very little or nothing at all in that way Now, where the scale which is associated with the name of Lord Burnham is really carried out, women teachers are, for the first time one might say in their history, receiving something like an adequate wage. If this is going to be greatly reduced, or if on the other hand, what is quite as dangerous to education-1 do not say to ourselves-the number of staff is being reduced or to be reduced in our schools, the whole country must suffer. The education of the country must receive a set-back, from which it cannot recover in a generation.

It is on this ground, and on this ground alone, it is on the ground of public service, that some of us older women strongly feel that we want to appeal to the younger women not to give way out of generosity which perhaps does not stop to think but pours out its service so willingly; they may be doing a serious injury to their profession. We want to appeal to you as older women to restrain this impulse of generosity that we know exists among the younger members of our profession. We ask you to think seriously before you give any promise or before you consent to any at all considerable retrenchment in your income. It is for the sake of others and above all for the sake of the country that we ask it.

The business part of the meeting being conluded, Canon Barnes gave an address on "The Problem of Religious Education".
[This has been printed separately and a copy is being sent to each member together weith this report. ]
The Chairman in thanking Canon Barnes said that it was very difficult to thank any speaker who had given so much of his very self, his own thought as Canon Barnes had that day. He had given a very real gift, something that would not pass away with that afternoon, but would give those present much to think about and turn over in their hearts and minds. They tendered their most cordial thanks to Canon Barnes. (Carried by acclamation.)

Miss Coward then proposed a vote of thanks to Miss Gray both as Chairman and as President for the past two years. It was impossible to express in words the gratitude of the Association to Miss Gray for all her work, but she hoped the members would try and show their feelings in the usual way. (Prolonged applause.)

This concluded the meeting.

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## THE REGISTRY.

While there has been a great decrease in the number of applications for mistresses, the proportion of appointments to applications has increased. There has been an increase in the number of members wanting work. Mistresses of long experience continue to find it very difficult to get appointments because of the high salaries they can command. Mistresses without either training or experience are very rarely appointed at the present time.

There have been many more applications from foreign countries and the Overseas Dominions for mistresses, but the salaries offered do not compare favourably with th:ose given in England. Applications have been received from :-
